New Year's Resolutions

If you are setting your goals for 2019, ask a 4-Her for help! One of the best parts of the 4-H program is its focus on setting SMART goals and developing action plans to achieve them. Ask any 4-H member and they'll be able to tell you how.

To make a goal SMART, follow these simple rules:

S - Specific

M - Measurable

A – Attainable (or actionable)

R - Relevant (or realistic)

T - Time-bound

A smart goal for a 4-H club might be- "Increase our club enrolled membership in 4-Honline by 10% by the enrollment deadline of May 1, 2018." A not-so-SMARTgoal would look like- "Get more club members."

After you have set your SMART goal, place it somewhere that you can see it often to remind you of the goal. A post -it note on a bedroom mirror is a great way to see this reminder daily.

Then, make an *action plan* to help you organize a system to make that goal a reality. You will want to schedule time when you will work your plan. Use a planner or log reminders in your phone. It is important to set some milestones that will help you know if you are following your action plan toward meeting your goals. Then, of course, you have to work your plan. Ask yourself "What is the next step I need to take to accomplish my goal?" It is important to periodically review your progress to hold yourself accountable. At the end you get to celebrate that you achieved your goals or reflect on what happened that you were not able to meet your goal.

Whether you are an adult making your New Year's Resolutions or a 4-H member working to accomplish the 4-H goals you set at the beginning of the 4-H year, January is a great time to reflect on what you hope to accomplish in the coming year. Take some time today to think about what you want your 2019 year to look like. Get out those goal statements and check on your progress. If you didn't set milestones when you wrote your goals, think about where you are and how much work is remaining to achieve your goal. If your club didn't require that you make goals, today would be a great day to set your 4-H goals!

Good luck achieving all that you hope for in 2019!





WPA Offers Youth Pig Project Scholarships

The Wisconsin Pork Association Youth Committee is once again offering Youth Pig Project scholarships. These scholarships are designed to assist 4-H and FFA members in establishing swine projects that can lead to development of life skills and career opportunities in the Wisconsin pork industry.

4-H and FFA youth are eligible to apply for a \$50.00 scholarship used to offset costs associated with their 2019 pig project. Scholarships will be awarded in three age divisions, as follows: Ages 9-12, 13-15, and 16-19 (as of January 1, 2019). Thanks to support from pig breeders throughout the state, at least twenty \$50.00 scholarships will be awarded this spring.

American Spirit East—June 7-16 or July 5-14, 2019 Registration Open now-Jan 10

Approximately 40 youth learn about America's heritage and build awareness of the many steps taken to gain U.S. independence and freedom by visiting historical sites in Philadelphia, New York, Boston and more. Delegates must be in 8th-10th

Space Camp—April 25-29 Registration Open now- Jan 1

Delegates must be in 10th-12th grade at the time of selection and minimum age is 15 by the time of the program. Delegates may only

National 4-H Conference—April 5-11 Applications due Dec 15

Six to eight youth are selected to attend this working civic conference held at the National 4-H Center in Washington, D.C. Each delegate selects an issue and collaborates with youth from across the country in an effort to help better direct future 4-H programming. Delegates spend the majority of time contributing to stimulating, task-oriented groups. One day is spent on Capitol Hill meeting with Wisconsin legislators. Delegates must be in 10th-12th grade during the program. The maximum age to participate is 18 as of 1/1/19. Approximate fee is \$1300.

Wisconsin 4-H & Youth Conference - June 24-27 2019 Registration April 2-15

Approximately 500 youth attend this pre-college program in Madison, WI each summer. Participants take part in educational seminars and assemblies and meet people from across Wisconsin. They are encouraged to take what they learn and share it with others in their home community. Delegates must be in 7th-10th grade at the time of selection. Members of Wisconsin Leadership Council, State Art Team, State Communications Team and Drama Company may be in 9th-13th grades.



Wisconsin Cloverbud Lessons Released September 1

Club leaders and officers are encourage to incorporate these activity plans into meeting for Cloverbud members!

Nine new activity plans designed specifically for Cloverbuds – youth in grades Kindergarten to 2nd grade – have been released on the Wisconsin 4-H Youth Development web page. Involve 4-H and community youth in activities that are hands-on, fun, and sometimes a little messy.

These nine lessons have been developed with Cloverbuds in mind, letting them explore science, theater, service, their senses and their own identities throughout the seasons. Each lesson is clearly laid out to get youth thinking, involve them in a hands-on activity and help them deepen their understanding through processing questions. Apple Volcanos

Supplies:

Baking Soda

Vinegar

Dish or container to catch the Fizz

Knife to cut center from apple

Apples 2-3 different kinds

Testing:

- 1. Prep apples by cutting a hole in the top of each apple
- 2. Put equal amount of baking soda in each apple
- 3. Pour vinegar into each apple and watch if fizz
- 4. Draw your conclusions. Did you use different kinds of apples? Did that effect the reaction? Why was there a difference between the apples?

Science:

When you combine baking soda and vinegar a chemical reaction occurs that releases carbon dioxide. The baking Soda (sodium bicarbonate) is a base while the vinegar (acetic acid) is an acid. When they react together they form carbonic acid, which breaks apart into water and carbon dioxide, and creates fizzing as it escapes.

SATURDAY, March 9, 2019 Menomonie Middle School

ALL plays must be registered at the Dunn County Extension Office by Friday, February 22. Telephone registrations will NOT be accepted.

A set of rules for our festival follow.

- Entry Division and Length of Performances: The difference between the two drama categories is as follows:
 - a. On-Stage Drama is a traditional one-act play using full costumes, props and sets. This will be performed on a stage without curtains in the Middle School Gymnasium. Please adjust your play accordingly.
 - One play, any length up to 30 minutes, including set-up and take-down time. It is suggested that performances be about 20 minutes in length.
 - Performances must include two or more actors.
 - 3. Any props that touch the floor should have felt on them to protect the floor and to dampen sound.
 - Mini-Dramas and Skits can be performed at or in any place (setting) and might include puppetry, creative dramatics, etc. No stage or lighting will be provided. Performances must include two or more actors.
 - Mini-dramas may use costumes and props similar to on-stage drama performances.
 - Skits use minimal props and costumes (less is better)
 - Mini drama and skit performances can be any length up to 15 minutes, including set-up and takedown time. Make sure your skit or mini-drama is within these time guidelines.
 - c. Puppetry can be up to 15 minutes and provide own puppet stage.
- All actors must be 4-H members. The director(s) may be any 4-H member(s) and/or adult(s).
- Stage lighting may not be available, due to the facilities (mini-drama and skits no stage or lighting provided).

- On-Stage Drama Props: Drama groups should plan for special props and sound effects equipment
 as needed. Any props need to have felt on the bottom to avoid scratching the stage.
- No hay or straw bales, animals, candles, real fire or real weapons are allowed.
- If a club uses fake weaponry or strobe lights, it must be noted on the registration form.
- Clubs may have more than one entry, but a 4-H member can be involved in only one play.
- The Drama Festival staff will have a Stage Manager/Emcee who will introduce the Club and the Club's Emcee. The Club's Emcee will be expected to introduce the play and set the scene for their play. Introduction of cast used at club's discretion. This will not be timed.
- Your presentation must not be the same one your club presented last year.
- Music plays (NOT reviews), where music is used as part of the play, are acceptable.
- Each group will receive a critique from the evaluators. Each drama participant will receive a participation ribbon and certificate. Clubs will be rated gold or silver.
- 12. Each entry will be given an "Award of Merit" for their area of outstanding achievement. The awards will be given from the following categories:
 - Total Voice Projection
 - · Cooperation, Enthusiasm and Spirit
 - Characterization
 - Creative Costuming
 - Audience Appeal
 - Creative Theme Development
 - Set
 - Humor
- Individual awards for outstanding youth performers will be presented, not to exceed two youth per play.
- Best Actor and Best Actress will be selected from each county.

Other helpful information

Evaluation Form: Upon your request, the committee will send an evaluation form that will be used at the festival. It notes the essential parts for viewing and critiquing a dramatic performance, and will be your copy for study prior to the play.

HALTER CLASS RULES

- No props allowed.
- Please lay down tippy models on a small cloth for judging. (It is then assumed that the judge may pick up the model to examine the other side.
- 3) Once a model has been shown in a halter class, it may not be shown in another.
- In breed classes, models are judged based on conformation, breed, assignment, & condition.
 - a) Stock type (including Stock type Mustangs)
 - b) Part Arab (including NSH, Morab, Quarb, ect).
 - c) Other Pure Spanish Breeds (including Lipizzanns, Spanish Mustangs, Criollo, Llanero, Manga, Larga, ect.)
 - d) Other mixed Spanish type breeds (including Warlanders, Spanish-Norman, ect.)
 - e) Other Pure/Mixed Pony Breeds (including Miniatures)
- 5) If a model's assigned breed or color is rare you must provide appropriate documentation to support the assigned. Please limit your documentation to no more than 1 8 ½" x 11" paper. (Make photocopies as necessary & be sure to note your source(s) but don't have an open book on the judging table as your documentation.)
- 6) In collectability classes, models will be judged on collectability & condition.
- 7) All models entered in halter collectability classes must have a card (no larger than 3" x 5") listing pertinent collectability information. Failure to provide the card will result in the model being disqualified from collectability, but not from breed judging.

PERFORMANCE CLASS RULES:

- Provide an explanation with all performance entries, except for basic pleasure classes.
- Tag model to be considered for judging. All other models will be considered props.
- 3) There will be a time limit of 10 minutes for set up between all performance classes.
- Each performance entry must fit into an 18"x30" space. (That's the maximum size allowed at NAN.)
- Costume & Western Pleasure classes will not be allowed props. All other performance classes will be allowed props.

EXHIBITORS who register postmarked before January 20 will pay \$8.50 for a half table (3 ft.) or \$11.50 thereafter. There will also be an additional fee of \$.50 per model per class. You can pre-register & pre-pay by specifying how many classes you are planning to enter & your packet will be ready for you at the door. (You can add more classes then & if you buy too many I will buy them back.)

Awards: Each class will be awarded up to 10th place. 2 high point awards will be awarded for each division. Divisions that will be in ring 1 are junior, novice (never won a championship) & therapeutic. Division that will show in ring 2 are senior, 6 years or less experience (can have won a championship) & open fun show. All exhibitors are responsible for MAKING SURE THAT THEIR HORSES ARE LISTED ON THE HIGH POINT SHEET PROVIDED IN THE SHOW PACKET & FOR MAKING SURE THEY ARE TURNED IN BEFORE THE HORSES START SHOWING. If showing in 2 or more divisions, make a copy for each (you're age & if qualified as a novice or 6 years or less.)

<u>Youth Show- definition age eligibility</u>: Age for Youth Exhibitors as of January 1: Jr- 12 years old and under, senior 13 – 19 years old, novice- 3 years or less of experience and never won a championship. 6 years or less experience can have won a championship.

Open fun & therapeutic ANY AGE

<u>Custom (CM) Youth:</u> Models may have been customized by professional unless specified (classes done by exhibitor.) Cm can show in performance classes.
