DATCP Issues Poultry Testing Waiver due to Antigen Shortage

Release Date: April 23, 2019

Contact: Leeann Duwe, Public Information Officer (608) 224-5005, <u>leeannm.duwe@wi.gov</u> MADISON – The Wisconsin Department of Agriculture, Trade and Consumer Protection (DATCP) is waiving certain poultry testing requirements due to a shortage of an antigen used for testing. As a result, poultry owners do not need to test their birds for the pullorum-typhoid disease while the waiver is in effect.

"The occurrence of pullorum-typhoid is rare and it does not cause disease in humans," says Dr. Darlene Konkle, acting State Veterinarian. "Poultry owners should continue to be vigilant about monitoring their birds and reporting any signs of disease to their veterinarian or DATCP."

Poultry owners must continue to test their birds for Mycoplasma gallisepticum or ensure the birds or eggs originated from a flock that tested negative for the disease in the calendar year.

The waiver applies until the antigen becomes available to certified testers. There is no timeframe for when the antigen may become available. Currently, only a single manufacturer makes the antigen. Waiver information, updates, and information about Wisconsin's poultry requirements are available on DATCP's website at https://datcp.wi.gov/Pages/Programs_Services/PoultryFlockPrograms.aspx.

DATCP's Division of Animal Health monitors animal health and disease threats, promotes humane treatment of animals, and provides licensing and registration regulation for animals in Wisconsin. or more information about protecting animal health, visit

Market Match Program Volunteers Needed



Would you like to see all families eat plenty of fruits and vegetables for a healthy life? YOU can help!



When a farmers' market customer of limited income spends one FoodShare dollar with their FoodShare card, they are given an additional dollar token to spend at the market up to \$10 a week. This program is called Market Match.

4-H and JONAH volunteers sell the tokens. This is where you can help!

Due to community support, Market Match has had lots of amazing success:

- Buying fresh, local food is important to FoodShare families. FoodShare
 patrons spend about \$21 per visit, while getting a maximum \$10 in direct
 match.
- Market Match participation is increasing. In 2018, non-duplicated FoodShare patrons using Market Match increased to 432, a 52% increase from 2015 when the program was started. Patrons' visits per season have also increased.

- Market Match provided over \$10,000 in direct match to FoodShare patrons this year. Patrons' annually report increased food security despite the lack of subsidized school meals in the summer.
- The majority of Market Match patrons reported eating more fruits and vegetables and saving money on produce.

Help us build a community where all children and families have access to healthy, affordable produce.

Please consider volunteering to help sell tokens at the Eau Claire Downtown Farmers Market each Saturday beginning the first weekend in June until the end of September. Tractor Safety

Tractors are a valuable part of any farm business, but can be unsafe if employees are not prepared with the right training. This course offers skills on basic farm safety, proper tractor operations, connecting and using implements and more. Get the job done more safely and efficiently!

Twelve year olds are eligible for a State of Wisconsin Certificate to drive tractors for their parents. Youth ages 13 and older are eligible for a Federal Certificate on their 14th birthday, allowing them to drive tractors for an employer. Youth involved in hazardous occupations other than on a farm operated by their parents, must have a Certificate of Exemption from these regulations in order to engage in such employment.





Track Leader: Shelley Pecha

Learn what real interior designers do! Campers will design a living space for their favorite celebrity. While designing this space, you will learn about project programming, the design process, space planning, and how to create a color palette. You will learn about and choose finishes and furniture for your celebrity space. You will hand render your floor plans, compose imagery boards and create a full presentation for your creation. did. Zines have a long history, from science fiction 'fan-zines' of the 1930's, to riot grrl and punk rock 'zines of the 1990's. We will create 'zines that share a personal story - a self-portrait narrative.

Sculpture Design Track Leader: Molly Uravitch

Throughout time people have gone to great lengths to alter, decorate, adom and modify their bodies with fantastical extensions that conceal, distort, transform or celebrate the human form. In this class you will learn a variety of construction methods and work with multiple materials to create a wearable sculpture that interacts with your body. This "Body Extension," could emulate an animal, plant, architectural structure, high fashion and more.

Video Game Design Track Leader: Joshua Seaver

Level up your skills and get started on realizing the game of your dreams! Learn the end-to-end process of creating video games and the many skills needed to bring them

to life using the same techniques and tools as the pros. Begin the week exploring the foundation of game creation—planning the fun—by sketching levels and character designs. Proceed to building a game through adding art, animation, programming logic and sound effects. At week's end, playtest the fun with your class, family and friends to get your game ready for all to the world to play!



Campers will explore the utility of wood and its properties while learning all about the various species and what makes them different and valuable. They will develop skills in processing techniques and finishing, while creating and building wood products.

Industrial Design Track Leader: Jennifer Astwood

Have you ever dreamed up an idea for a form and wanted to make something functional? We will be creating and making designs from shoes to candles this summer! The Infinite World of Plastics: Materials, Molds and Processing Track Leader: Wei Zheng

Learn about the chemical make-up of plastics. With plastics surrounding us in our everyday lives, there are so many different kinds. By testing the various kinds and learning about their processing, you'll determine what can be done with them. Depending on the type of plastic, many can be recycled to make new plastic materials.

Becoming a Teacher in a STEAM Field Track Leader: Todd Hayden

Have you ever heard the statement, "if you can read this, thank a teacher?" It could go one step further: "If you are interested in STEAM, thank a STEAM teacher!" If you: (1) like one or more STEAM subjects, (2) want to make a difference in the lives of others, and/ or (3) want to be part "of where it all begins," then this is the track for you! Campers will develop leadership skills, prepare for college, and explore teaching careers. By the end of this interactive and inspiring class, you will have learned a great deal about yourself and possible career pathways.

Technology Engineering Track Leaders: Paul Craig and David Ding


