

This November I was able to travel with 35 youth and 4 Adult chaperones as the Wisconsin Delegation to Atlanta, Georgia. This was by far my favorite Experience that I have been able to go on. It puts you out of your comfort zone a little bit by choosing the seminars for you and having only a few from each delegation in each seminar. We had a bunch of really good speakers, my personal favorites being Manny Ohonme. Manny, the founder of “Samaritan’s Feet”, told us his story of getting his first pair of shoes given to him by someone from WI, which made his story that much more interesting to me since his story started with someone from WI. “Samaritan’s Feet” is a company that donates shoes to communities in high poverty areas, he started his mission in 2003 and has donated about 8,000,000 shoes since then. I am so glad I was able to have this experience, and be able to meet so many new people and learn so much about how other states run their 4-H, like Georgia. My community service was going to one of the elementary school and help kids with their 4-H projects. In Georgia they don’t have fairs like we do which was very interesting to me. They do one project, a 5-10 minute

University of Wisconsin Small Ruminant Webinar Series starts January 15, 2020

(Madison) The University of Wisconsin Animal Sciences Department and the Division of Extension will be hosting a small ruminant webinar series beginning on January 15, 2020. The program will start at 7:30 p.m. and end by 9 p.m. These meetings can be taken from your home using a computer, a phone, or at your local extension office using Zoom technology. Check with your extension office if they plan to host. Zoom meetings allow for more natural interaction between the presenters and participants and provide an opportunity to ask questions and have a discussion with other online users.

“We are excited to bring back this type of remote education for sheep producers across Wisconsin,” said Todd Taylor, UW Madison Shepherd. These webinars are a new spin from the long-standing and widespread sheep ETN meetings that retired Dr. Dave Thomas, sheep specialist, hosted during his tenure at the University of Wisconsin.

Dr. Daniel Morrical will speak on late gestation ewe nutrition during the January webinar. Dan Morrical joined the Iowa State University staff in 1984 as Extension Sheep Specialist after completing his doctorate at New Mexico State University. He held the rank of Full Professor as of July 1, 1995, and retired from full-time teaching in 2017. While at Iowa State University, Dr. Dan Morrical was responsible for educational programs in all areas of sheep production, ranging from nutrition, genetics, marketing, and management. Research areas focused on applied projects in the areas of nutrition, forage utilization, genetics, out-of-season breeding, and lamb survival. Dr. Morrical now serves as Premier’s on-staff small ruminant nutritionist and sheep production advisor. Most recently, he’s introduced a line of [“GOLD FORMULA” mineral premixes](#) under *The Shepherd’s Choice®* brand, aimed to maximize hoof health and immunity.

26th Annual Indianhead Sheep and Goat Breeders Association Small Ruminant Clinic set for Saturday, February 1, 2020

The Indianhead Sheep and Goat Breeders Association is excited to be celebrating the 26th Anniversary of our Small Ruminant Clinic on Saturday, February 1, 2020. The Annual Small Ruminant Clinic continues to be one of the largest educational events of the winter for sheep and goat producers and 4-H and FFA youth in the Upper Midwest. The clinic will begin with registration at 8:00 am at the Wisconsin Indianhead Technical College (WITC) Conference Center, 1900 College Drive, Rice Lake, WI 54868.

The 2020 Clinic will feature keynote speaker Chris Duemler DVM. Chris Duemler DVM, a graduate of the University of Missouri-Columbia, has been a practitioner for 42 years as a food animal veterinarian, as well as an owner at the Brodhead Veterinary Medical Center in Brodhead, Wisconsin. As member of AVMA he has served on the Clinical Practitioners Advisory Committee (CPAC) to Council of Biologic and Therapeutic Agents (COBTA) and was Chairman of Animal Agriculture Liaison Committee (AALC). He authored Herd Health Procedures and Prevention for The Dairy Goat Production Handbook Langston University American Institute for Goat Research. Dr. Duemler will be addressing herd health in his keynote and will also address udder health in a breakout session.

Other sessions will include barn surveillance cameras and facility design. Marketing will be addressed during a panel including producers and buyers. There will also be a producer panel for sheep producers and one for goat producers discussing "What we wish we would have known when we started." Other guest speakers will address the topics of rotational grazing.

Youth will have the opportunity to work with Dr. Justin Luther, Animal Science Professor at UW-River Falls, during the day. A Skillathon will test what the youth have learned throughout the day, with awards for different age groups. The youth clinic will qualify for any educational requirements that your counties may require to show.

A registration form can be found online by visiting www.indianheadsheepandgoat.org or the ISGBA Facebook page. Registration for the Small Ruminant Clinic is \$40 per person for ISGBA members and \$50 per person for non-members. 4-H and FFA and other youth pay only \$15 per person for the clinic. The registration fee covers the program costs and the noon meal. Preregistration deadline is January 24, 2020. Late registrations is an additional \$10 for adults and \$5 for youth.

These events are great ways to learn more about shooting and the outdoors, as well as having fun meeting others involved in shooting sports.

Shooting sports instructor certification workshops are also held at various locations throughout the state. These are excellent opportunities for parents and other adults interested in teaching shooting sports to become certified and join our group of instructors. We need more instructors in our group to continue as well as expand opportunities. Volunteer instructors must also complete the 4-H Adult Volunteer Orientation and Screening (ROPES). WI State 4-H Livestock Quiz Bowl and 4-H Skillathon contests scheduled for March 7, 2020

(Madison) The 4-H Livestock Quiz Bowl and State 4-H Skillathon contests will be held together on Saturday March 7, 2020 at UW Madison Animal Sciences Building, Madison, WI. **Deadline for registration is Feb. 21, 2020, 5 p.m. Only emailed registrations will be accepted, mailed registrations will NOT be accepted.** The cost is \$12 per youth and due at the time of registration. Registration starts at 9 a.m., competitions start at 9:30 a.m. Teams are encouraged to participate in both contests as they will be occurring at the same time. The planning committee reserves the right to alter schedule if needed to manage both contests effectively.

The teams are divided into three age divisions and teams can consist of 3 or 4 members. The junior division are youth who are under 14 years of age as of Jan.1, 2020. The senior division are youth who are all 14 years of age or older as of Jan. 1, 2020. A mixed team must contain at least one youth from each age division.

Livestock Bowl is a quiz competition where all the questions are about beef, sheep, swine, and meat goat topics and students use a buzzer in order to answer the questions. Teams compete in a double elimination format by giving oral answers to questions posed by a moderator. Each match has both an individual and toss-up question round. The winning 4-H senior team will represent Wisconsin at the National 4-H Livestock Quiz Bowl competition in Louisville, KY at the North American International Livestock Exposition.

Skillathon contest is made up of a written quiz and learning stations such as breed identification, feed identification, equipment identification as well as some team activities such as demonstrating evaluation skills. The top Senior level 4-H team will represent Wisconsin at the National 4-H Skillathon Contest, held each fall in Louisville at the North American International Livestock Exposition.

Competition in Quiz Bowl & Skillathon encourages members to develop a more complete knowledge of animals and related subjects. This contest provides an educational program for all project members, including those who may not own a project animal, and provides a way to develop self-confidence. These programs are a great parallel to some similar programs that breed associations and other organizations conduct such as Junior Cattle Nationals, NJSA (National Junior Swine Association) and the All-American Sheep Show.

“TRACKS” – December 2019

Participation in Wildlife WHEP Wisconsin 4-H & Wisconsin 4-H Forestry activities are open to all Wisconsin 4-H club members interested in wildlife and forestry. You can be enrolled in any 4-H project and participate in the activities.

Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Friends,

When there is snow on the ground, tracks are one of the most obvious ways to identify creatures. However, there are more ways to discover what has been lurking!
Scratch marks on trees, logs and rocks: Measure the distance between claw marks to get an idea of the size of the animal; for example, raccoon scratch marks are about 2 1/2" wide.
Tree holes: a tree hole with fresh light-colored wood around the opening is probably being used by a mammal. It must gnaw around the opening to keep the tree from healing.
Eyeshine: Many animals have a mirror-like layer inside the backs of their eyes. This reflective layer bounces the light around their eyes and allows them to see better in the dark. Different animals have different colors of eyeshine.

White - fish, spider, Yellow – raccoon, Red - porcupine, owl, Orange - opossum

Greenish white – deer, Pink/Red – rabbit, Green – frog, Green or Gold - fox

Sheds: Skins, antlers, feathers, hairs and more.

Bones: Most mammal bones are rounded. They are hollow with a thick outer wall. Bird bones have sharper edges. They are hollow with a thin outer wall. Fish bones are usually thin and flat.

What's up in the winter sky?

Around December 14-15 you may catch a glimpse of the Geminids meteor shower, considered to be one of the most spectacular showers of the year. The Geminids are not associated with a comet but an asteroid. The asteroid takes about 1.4 years to orbit the sun.

Older youth can qualify for National 4-H Competition by participating in the contests. **Wisconsin placed 6th in the 30th Annual National 4-H WHEP Contest** from Sunday, July 14, through Wednesday, July 17, 2019. The Wisconsin 4-H Team was represented by Caeley Champeau, Taylor Champeau, Phillip Mayer, and Micah Stege. Coaches were Allen Gross and Robin Champeau. Taylor Champeau of the Jackson Explorers received the 3rd high-point individual award. Fourth place high individual award was given to Micah Stege of the St Lawrence Eager Beavers.

Each 4-H music group must contain at least five 4-H members. Clubs may have more than one entry. Members may participate as a performer in only one group. Clubs may combine to form a group.

TYPES OF ENTRIES:

Vocal	Five or more vocalists with or without accompaniment. Emphasis is on the vocal quality of the music. Minimal costuming (if any) and no props or choreography. Accompaniment can be taped, BUT IT MUST BE INSTRUMENTAL ONLY, NO VOCAL.
Instrumental	Five or more instrumentalists with standard musical instruments. Emphasis is on the instrumental quality of the music. Minimal costuming and no props or choreography.
Dance	Five or more dancers. Accompaniment may be recorded and can have vocal on tape. Emphasis is on the quality of dance. Performance may be with or without costumes or props.
Novelty	Five or more performers. Emphasis is on total production. Should include choreography*, costumes and props. Generally has a topical theme or focus. Pantomiming to records is not permitted. Accompaniment can be taped, BUT IT MUST BE INSTRUMENTAL ONLY, NO VOCAL. *Choreography is the composition and arrangement of vocalists/dancers.

MUSIC FESTIVAL RULES:

- (1) Accompaniments and direction can be by 4-H members or adults. Adult accompanists or directors will not be allowed to sing with their group's presentation. Taped INSTRUMENTAL accompaniment is acceptable. Each category will be judged independently; that is, dance against dance, vocal against vocal, etc., and rated as follows:

All groups: Gold Silver

Special certificates will be given according to the discretion of the judge(s) (as in costuming, use of young members, audience appeal, etc.).

- (2) All performances must be no longer than 15 minutes in length, *including set up and take down*. Make sure that your performance, not only the music, singing, etc., but EVERYTHING you do on stage fits within the 15-minute time limit! If you go over the 15-minute limit, you may be dropped a placing, at the discretion of the judge(s).
- (3) Groups must supply any props, except piano and folding chairs.

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- (5) Two judges will share the responsibility of evaluating the music presentations and one judge will talk to the performers in a separate room after the group completes its' take down. Critiques will be given at the end of the musical performances to each group.
- (6) No hay bales, straw bales, candles or real fire on stage.
- (7) There will be no practices allowed on the stage the day of the festival.
- (8) Each county can select one music group to perform at State Fair.

A schedule for workers will be set up at the final music committee meeting and will be sent out with the final performance schedule.

Consider It

The Tri-County Music Festival will be coming up before you know it. We hope your club will consider preparing an entry for this event. Your participation will make the afternoon a great one for members, families and friends!

Points to Ponder

A music entry consists of 5 or more 4-H club members. Clubs may combine members to present a musical performance. Clubs may also have more than one entry in the Music Festival. Entries may be vocal, instrumental, dance, novelty, or any combination of these. Groups may use pianists, instrumentalists, or recorded music for accompaniment. Groups may choose to perform without any accompaniment (a capella). Performance time is 10 minutes with an additional 5 minutes allowed for set-up and removal of props.

Helpful Hints

If you don't have someone who works with music in your club, find a musical helper within your community. Have one adult leader supervise the music preparations and another adult leader organize props and costumes, etc. Plan ahead. Plan to get started in right away as enrollment begins now. Begin practice about a month before the festival. It helps to prepare audio tapes and give them to group members to listen to and sing to – this reduces practice time considerably. Remember to turn in your music festival registration form on time. Use a theme. Use narration or speaking parts/dialog to transition between musical selections.

Several shorter songs are better than one longer one.

Possible Themes

Music from tv or motion pictures — patriotic music saluting America — ethnic music — a salute to a famous person or character — music around the world — a salute to 4-H — school days — animals — the zoo — Disney music — rock 'n' roll — square dancing — traveling — clowns — the circus — the railroad — dancing from the 50s, 60s, 70s, 80s and 90s — music from long ago — cowboys — country western music — families — children's songs — nursery rhymes — a salute to the armed forces — a salute to a special day/event in history — magical things — sweet things — sacred music — etc. etc. etc. Be creative, involve the members Have fun!

Judges Look For

Overall appearance — enthusiasm — SMILES — pitch and tone quality — dynamics — a bit of harmony in your music — movement during your presentation — SMILES — costumes and special effects — audience appeal — variety — kids who are having fun — and MORE SMILES.

Demonstration & Speaking Contest

Helping people speak in front of groups is one of the most important life skills 4-H offers. One of the best ways to help 4-H members prepare for the future is by helping them to become better public speakers & demonstrators. With this in mind, we would like all clubs to work together to stress the importance of speaking & demonstrations.

4-H Demonstration

The ability to demonstrate is an important speaking skill. Demonstrating means that you show how to do or make something while you talk. Here are some tips:

- Select something that you do well
- Make attractive posters. Use large letters and space them so that they are easy to read.
- Assemble all materials necessary to complete your demonstration.
- Demonstrate as you talk.
- Show the finished product.
- Summarize the steps of the demonstration.

An educational brochure is available from the Extension Office on how to do a demonstration.

DEMONSTRATION DIVISION

Age categories and time limits:

- ~ Cloverbuds (K-2) - maximum time: 3 minutes
- ~ 3rd & 4th Grade: 4-5 minutes
- ~ 5th & 6th Grade: 5-8 minutes
- ~ 7th & 8th Grade: 6-10 minutes
- ~ 9th Grade & Up: 8-15 minutes

The categories listed below are types of demonstrations that can be done in the contest. You may enter more than one category. You may also enter as an individual and/or as a team in each category.

Formal Demonstrations - Showing and telling the audience how to make or do something. Presents information through actions with an explanation. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and a time to answer questions. Length is determined by your age group (see above).

Illustrated Talk - Presents information with the use of visual aids such as maps, charts, posters, graphs, pictures, slides, or models. Has an introduction, body, conclusion, and time to answer questions. Length is determined by age group (see above).

Action Center - Sharing ideas and showing how to do a skill in an informal way. The audience should participate and ask questions throughout the entire demonstration. The demonstrator converses with the audience members who are standing around the demonstration area. Audience participates by talking with the demonstrator, trying things, doing, tasting, judging and asking

questions. Handouts may be used (instructions, recipes, etc.). Posters or pictures can be used. The demonstration should be 15-30 minutes long. A brochure is available at the Extension Office which gives tips for planning and presenting your action center.

Recognition:

- All Demonstration Contest participants will receive a fair ribbon.
- Certificates will be awarded for each participant.
- Fair premiums will be offered to all participants, per individual county rules. You **MUST** enter your demonstration on your fair form to receive premium.

The amounts listed above are for individual demonstrations. Team demonstrations will be awarded a premium double the amount of the individual premium. These premiums will be paid along with your regular fair check. The deadline to register (late entries will NOT receive fair premiums) is **February 10, 2019**

SPEAKING DIVISION

The following are four categories and rules (enter any or all):

Original Speech

Cloverbuds: up to 1 minute (Grades K-2)
Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4)
Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)
Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)
Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

1. Talk must be developed by the member who is presenting it. It cannot have been given previously in another contest or previously critiqued.
2. Only Cloverbud & Novice division speakers may have their speeches written out and read them. Junior through Senior division speakers should use note cards.

Interpretive Reading

Cloverbuds: Up to 1 minute (Grades K-2)
Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4)
Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)
Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)
Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

1. Readings may be either prose, poetry, original, or a selected reading. If not original, the author should be credited.
2. All readers should use full-size copies of their selections (**NO** notecards). Please mount your copy on construction paper or other heavy paper (8 ½ x 11" or 9 x 12"). Do **NOT** read your selection from the book.
3. Create an introduction to introduce your reading.

Contact the Extension Office for an information sheet that provides more information and tips for doing Interpretive Readings.

4-H Promotion - Your chance to promote 4-H. Tell why you are involved and why others should join. Props or visual aids are optional.

- Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4)
- Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)
- Intermediate & Senior: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7-13)

Dynamic Duo - For a team of two - may be two 4-H members of any age or combination of ages or a 4-H member and an adult. This is an interpretive reading consisting of a dialogue for two. Up to 6 minutes in length.

Each participant will receive a participation ribbon and a certificate. A top overall speaker in each age division will be selected and receive a trophy (across all entry divisions).

Drama Rules & Registration
SATURDAY, February 29, 2020

ALL plays must be registered at the Chippewa County Extension Office by Monday, February 10. Telephone registrations will NOT be accepted.

A set of rules for our festival follow.

1. **Entry Division and Length of Performances:** The difference between the two drama categories is as follows:
 - a. *On-Stage Drama* is a traditional one-act play using full costumes, props and sets.
 1. One play, any length up to 30 minutes, including set-up and take-down time. It is suggested that performances be about 20 minutes in length.
 2. Performances must include two or more actors.
 3. Any props that touch the floor should have felt on them to protect the floor and to dampen sound.
 - b. *Mini-Dramas and Skits* can be performed at or in any place (*setting*) and might include puppetry, creative dramatics, etc. No stage or lighting will be provided. Performances must include two or more actors.
 1. *Mini-dramas* may use costumes and props similar to on-stage drama performances
 2. *Skits* use minimal props and costumes (*less is better*)
 3. Mini drama and skit performances can be any length up to 15 minutes, including set-up and take-down time. Make sure your skit or mini-drama is within these time guidelines.
 - c. *Puppetry* – can be up to 15 minutes and provide own puppet stage.
2. All actors must be 4-H members. The director(s) may be any 4-H member(s) and/or adult(s).
3. Stage lighting may not be available, due to the facilities (mini-drama and skits – no stage or lighting provided).

4. On-Stage Drama Props: Drama groups should plan for special props and sound effects equipment as needed. Any props need to have felt on the bottom to avoid scratching the stage.
5. No hay or straw bales, animals, candles, real fire or real weapons are allowed.
6. If a club uses fake weaponry or strobe lights, it must be noted on the registration form.
7. Clubs may have more than one entry, but a 4-H member can be involved in only one play.
8. The Drama Festival staff will have a Stage Manager/Emcee who will introduce the Club and the Club's Emcee. The Club's Emcee will be expected to introduce the play and set the scene for their play. Introduction of cast used at club's discretion. This will not be timed.
9. Your presentation must not be the same one your club presented last year.
10. Music plays (*NOT* reviews), where music is used as part of the play, are acceptable.
11. Each group will receive a critique from the evaluators. Each drama participant will receive a participation ribbon and certificate. Clubs will be rated gold or silver.
12. Each entry will be given an "Award of Merit" for their area of outstanding achievement. The awards will be given from the following categories:
 - Total Voice Projection
 - Cooperation, Enthusiasm and Spirit
 - Characterization
 - Creative Costuming
 - Audience Appeal
 - Creative Theme Development
 - Set
 - Humor
13. Individual awards for outstanding youth performers will be presented, not to exceed two youth per play.
14. Best Actor and Best Actress will be selected from each county.

Other helpful information

Evaluation Form: Upon your request, the committee will send an evaluation form that will be used at the festival. It notes the essential parts for viewing and critiquing a dramatic performance, and will be your copy for study prior to the play.

- Submitted photos must relate to the stated theme above.
- High quality, creative photographs with good composition are preferred and strongly encouraged.
- Entries will be accepted from youth, adults, amateurs, professionals and Farm Technology Days staff/volunteers.
- Entries submitted by a minor (under the age of 18 at the time of submission) or which include the visible face of a minor require parental signature on the entry form.
- Entries can be black and white, color, or sepia and may be digitally manipulated.
- Photos must be taken in 2018, 2019 or 2020 and taken by the individual submitting the entry.
- Photos must be printed, matted or framed, and not exceed a total overall size of 11" x 14".
- Each participant may submit one (1) photo.
- A photo title is encouraged for labelling and display purposes at the show (include on entry form).
- Entries will be accepted from **Monday June 1, 2020 through Friday, June 26, 2020** at the UW Extension Office located at 227 1st Street, Altoona, WI 54720. Entries can be mailed or dropped off during business hours. Clearly label package with "FTD photo exhibit".
- Up to 50 photos will be displayed at the 2020 Eau Claire County Farm Technology Days show in the Rural Event Center (REC) tent from July 21-23, 2020. Additional photos may be displayed if space is available.
