
Each year we have a county-wide banquet designed to provide recognition in three very important areas :





The Queen will broaden her skills in public speaking, develop effective marketing presentations, and use social media to enhance product promotion. She will also be a spokesperson for various media outlets and teach students using an education program.

A successful applicant will be a woman between 18 and 24 years old as of January 1, 2021. She will be a high school graduate and motivated to broaden her skills in public speaking, marketing, education, social media, interviewing, and developing and delivering presentations. The Wisconsin Honey Queen serves as a professional representative for the Wisconsin Honey Producers Association, a trade group representing beekeepers, honey producers, and those working to protect honeybees.

<u>No prior experience with beekeeping is required</u> for this unique opportunity. The candidate must be willing to learn about the industry through a variety of paid training opportunities. Applicants may be full-time college students or have other part-time employment.

The 2021 Wisconsin Honey Queen will travel throughout Wisconsin for a variety of appearances, including the 2021 Wisconsin State Fair, through November 2021. In addition, the Wisconsin Honey Queen maintains a professional Facebook page to further promote and teach about the industry. In the process of educating and speaking, the Wisconsin Honey Queen promotes honey as a wholesome and useful product. No prior experience in the beekeeping industry is required in this role, as the chosen applicant will go through a variety of training sessions.

ESSENTIAL DUTIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES

-Teach students in elementary, middle, and high schools by giving presentations about the importance of honeybees and beekeeping

Each year Tractor Supply Company (TSC) does two fundraising campaigns that benefit Wisconsin 4-H. The fall campaign is October 7 through October 18. For every \$1 paper clover sold at a Wisconsin TSC, 90 cents comes back to the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation to be used for leadership activities.

Previous years, the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation has offered an incentive to 4-H clubs to plan an instore activity or display during the Paper Clover Campaign. This year, TSC is requesting no physical presence from 4-H programs at their stores including outdoor spaces like parking lots. So we are doing something a bit different. We are asking that clubs get creative with their social media, emails, displays (stand-alone - not staffed) or any other promotion. Any club that does a promotion with a store the week before or during the fall paper clover campaign and provides the Foundation with photos, clippings and/or screen shots, the Foundation will give that club \$20. And, if the promotion is chosen as one of the five best, the Foundation will give the club an additional \$50.

Here are the rules:

- Ask the 4-H Foundation (Joanne@Wis4HFoundation.org) for information about the TSC store (locations and store manager name).
- Call the store manager with ideas about what you would like to do (display, photo board, contact with local media, social media, etc.). Your activity must be the week prior to the paper clover campaign or during the paper clover campaign and must promote 4-H and the TSC paper clover campaign.
- Ask for ideas from the store manager and permission to move forward with ideas that you believe will work.
- 4. Get promoting!
- Take photos and get those to the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation as soon as possible (especially if it's early in the campaign – we will use those photos on social media to promote the campaign).
- Report your experience to the Foundation via email -Joanne@Wis4HFoundation.org. Include a description of what you did and include what store, the date(s) of the promotion, the results of your promotion and at least one photo of your promotion. Reports must be received by November 1, 2020, to be eligible for cash awards.

We are going to have to use all our creativity with social networks, emails, displays, and anything else you can think of to get people to donate. Let's get promoting Wisconsin 4-H!

WI 4-H Foundation Kicks Off 2020-2021 Arts Contest

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation has kicked off their Celebrate the Arts Contest; challenging all 4-H members to explore and share their creativity. The contest is open to any current Wisconsin 4-H member, with cash prizes totaling nearly \$1,000. The contest will be held virtually, with photos of all entries submitted electronically. Entries are being accepted now through November 1.

The contest is broken into eight categories:

- 1. Drawing Using Any Medium
- 2. Painting (acrylic, watercolor or oil)
- 3. Pottery, Ceramics or Clay
- 4. Photography
- 5. Paper
- 6. Fabric, Yarn or Fiber
- 7. Wood
- 8. Any Other Media (ex: digital, metalcraft, jewelry, leatherwork, wax, eggshells, taxidermy, etc.)

A winner will be chosen in each category with a Best of Show Award given to the top entry as chosen by the judging committee. Category winners will be purchased by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation for \$100, with the Best of Show entry receiving an additional \$150. Winners will be notified by email by November 20, and a complete winner's list, as well as photos of the winning entries, will be on the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation website by December 15, 2020.

Winning entries become the property of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation. The Foundation will sell the art in an art auction to be held in the spring of 2021. Proceeds from the Celebrate the Arts auction will be split with half invested in the Talen Endowment for 4-H Arts Programming for future program needs and half used for arts programming in the next 4-H program year.

Madison, WI [August 1, 2020] — <u>Cedar Crest Ice Cream</u>, Cedarburg, Wisconsin, and the <u>Wisconsin 4-H Foundation</u> have teamed up again to present the "Cedar Crest Ice Cream 4-H Flavor Contest" for Wisconsin 4-H clubs. More than 1600 clubs are eligible to create and submit a flavor 'recipe' with the top clubs named as finalists, and the top flavor produced for summer 2021.

According to Brenda Scheider, Executive Director of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation, the contest is a great opportunity for 4-H youth to work together to develop and name their flavor. "The most exciting part of the contest is the winning flavor will be available through Cedar Crest beginning next July." The annual contest has already yielded popular flavors including Deep Woods, created by the Badger Boosters 4-H Club of West Bend and Wisconsin Campfire S'mores, created by the Springbrook 4-H Club of New Richmond. This year's winning flavor was Road Trip Wisconsin, created by the Trail Blazers 4-H Club of Holmen in LaCrosse County.

A panel of ice cream experts chosen by Cedar Crest judges the entries. The company manufacturers more than 80 flavors of ice cream, along with frozen custard, sherbet and sorbet at its Manitowoc, Wisconsin, plant, and distributes products in five states. Many of the flavors now produced by Cedar Crest, including Wisconsin Campfire S'mores and Big Muddy, are a result of the contest.

Awards Committee Updates

The Awards Committee has meet and has many updates for 4-H youth and families.

For youth who had an educational experienced canceled in 2020: youth will need to reapply for the experience on 4Honline. **Previous scholarships from the Leaders Association will be honored** for the rescheduled 2021 experience--youth will not need to reapply for a scholarship. Example: Fall 2019, youth was awarded a scholarship from the Leaders Association for the 2020 American Spirit Experience-East. This 2020 trip was canceled. If the youth would like to go on the same trip in 2021: Fall 2020, youth does not need to complete a nomination form to request funding for the 2021 American Spirit Experience-East; youth will still need reapply to 4Honline for the 2021 experience. If this youth also wanted to go on the 2021 CWF experience, the youth would need to apply for scholarship for this trip following the guidelines on the nomination form.

Remember there is a new Record Book format that you can use. Both formats are on the Extension Eau Claire County website: <u>https://eauclaire.extension.wisc.edu/4-h-forms-documents/</u>. The last page of the Record Book –<u>the Nomination Form (attached here) should be included in the front inside pocket of everyone's Record Book</u>. The Awards Committee would like to remind youth of the opportunity for county level scholarships. Youth can <u>apply</u> for a county level scholarship from the 4-H Leaders Association for any of the following educational experiences: 4-H State Youth Conference @ UW-Madison, American Spirit Experience-East, CWF - Citizen Washington Focus in Washington D.C., National 4-H Congress in Atlanta, Ga., and National 4-H Conference in Washington D.C.

As a reminder, youth can <u>request</u> funding from the 4-H Leaders Association for: State Art Groups (4-H Drama Company, 4-H Art Team, 4-H Communications Team), Fall Forum, Space Camp, and Space Camp Counselor. This funding request is directly through the 4-H Leaders Association and is not part of the scholarship application process; a nomination form <u>does not</u> need to be completed for: State Art Groups (4-H Drama Company, 4-H Art Team, 4-H Communications Team), Fall Forum, Space Camp, and Space Camp Counselor.

Although it is uncertain what programs will be available for 2020-2021, we believe in the educational value of the scholarship application process. The Awards Committee is currently looking at ways to hold the interview process as safely as possible, including figuring out virtual options and access to internet if that is needed for your family.

Clover Leaves

The committee has agreed to waive the requirements needed to achieve in 4-H for the 2019-2020 4-H

<u>year.</u> There is no minimum number of meetings required; you are not required to do a demonstration; you are not required to do a public exhibit. To apply for the scholarships, youth will need to complete a Record Book and the documents outlined on the Nomination Form.

To apply for scholarship or be nominated for a county level award, **youth need to include a youth leader**ship page in their record book. The youth leadership experience does not have to be something that you <u>exhibited at the fair</u>. The youth leadership page will showcase at least one Youth Leadership experience you led/facilitated during the past 4-H year. Youth Leadership opportunities through 4-H are endless: leading a club activity, being a club officer, promoting 4-H, setting up a community service project, sharing with others about a 4-H project, educating, fundraising, etc. If you were unable to carry out a youth leadership project you had planned because of changes with COVID, still use the 'youth leadership experience' record book page to share what you were hoping to do.

4-H Club and Project Leaders can nominate youth who have completed at least 8th grade for: Achievement, Citizenship, or Leadership, Farm Bureau Outstanding Youth Awards (Agriculturally Related), and "I Dare You" Awards (Sponsored by OYC - Older Youth Council). <u>This portion of the Nomination Form needs to be</u> <u>completed by October 5th.</u>

The number of record books each club can submit to the county has changed from 15 to 10. <u>Clubs may</u> <u>submit 1 record book for every 10 members.</u> (1 book for 3-5 grade and 1 book for 6-8 grade for <10 members; 2 books for 3-5 grade and 2 book for 6-8 grade for 11-20 members; 3 books for 3-5 & 3 books for 6-8 for 21-30 members; etc.) Leaders are to complete the bottom portion of the Nomination Form and submit the record book by October 5th.

Trash & Litter Clean-up

Trash and litter in the environment can cause harm to plants, animals, and the ecosystem. Cleaning up a roadside or natural area from trash and litter might not sound like the most exciting summer activity, but it can certainly improve the quality of the landscape.

While doing a summertime clean-up be on the lookout for wild parsnip, poison ivy, and harmful trash (syringes, needles, dead animals, leaking batteries, chemical containers, un-labeled open containers, or any environmentally unsafe trash) Also, remember to recycle when you can.

Tips for roadside clean-up:

- have a first aid kit and cell phone available
- where bright clothes
- always work towards on-coming traffic
- place a sign on the side of the road at the beginning and end of your work site
- wear long sleeves, pants, and gloves
- have plenty of water available
- avoid working during bad weather or high traffic times

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Encountering poison ivy can cause a rash. Poison Ivy is easily identifiable. It can grow as a bush but is most commonly seen as a vine. The leaves come in groups of 3 with one leaf at the end of the stem. The formation of the three leaves reminds me of an elephant with two ears and the trunk in the middle. The leaves are not serrated but may have small lobes. Poison ivy never has thorns. If someone comes in contact with poison ivy, wash the area with soap and water as soon as possible. Wash all clothing, shoes, and other items that had contact with the plant or with a person who touched the plant. Wear vinyl or cotton gloves when handling or washing items that have touched poison ivy.

Wild parsnip is a plant that grows commonly in open grassland and roadside. This plant can cause a chemical reaction on some one's skin when it is exposed to sunlight called phytophotodermatitis. This essentially causes a chemical burn on the skin resulting in blisters and possible scarring. Wild parsnip can be identified by its small yellow flowers on the end of tall stalks in the shape of an umbel. It looks very similar to Queen Anne's Lace and wild carrot. When someone comes into contact with wild parsnip immediately cover the area from the sun, then wash the area with soap and water. As with poison ivy, wash any clothing or equipment that may gave come into contact with the plant.

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Participants should also avoid any environmentally un-safe trash including dead animals, needles syringes, leaking batteries, chemical containers, and unlabeled open containers. Bring trash bags specifically for items that can be recycled. Reaching out to parks departments or other agencies to find some different spots that need to be cleaned may provide you with a variety of projects available to you.

When doing a roadside clean-up, make sure you have a cell phone and first-aid kit available. Wearing bright clothes is a must. Avoid high traffic times in the day and bad weather. It is also a good idea to place a sign at the beginning and end of the site you intend to work at. Always work with the younger participants furthest from the road. Continue along the side of the road facing traffic. Coordinate your trash pickups with county or state road agencies if possible. They may be able to provide you with signs and possibly pick-up your trash bags.

If you spend time on your canoe or kayak, you may want to collect trash or litter on a riverway, lake, or pond.

Tips for a paddle clean-up

-make sure everyone is wearing a PFD or personal flotation device

- always maintain 3 points of contact while reaching into the body of water to pick up trash
- -bring a fishing net to help extend your reach
- -be aware of other boats near you and follow all boating laws

This could be part of your career!

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
What Are Observations?

An observation records an encounter with an individual organism at a particular time and location. This includes encounters with signs of organisms like tracks, nests, or things that just died. When you make an observation, you'll record:



Your observations don't need to include all of these parts, but they do in order to become *research quality observations for science*. Remember, you should make separate observations for each separate organism you encounter. If you observed something that is not wild, like a garden plant or a lion in the zoo, make sure to mark it as captive/cultivated to prevent it from becoming research quality.










How did you end up in a survival situation?

A plane crashed into some trees while we were on our way to Upham Woods. We used the pine brush from the crash to build a fort on an oak tree (we know it was oak tree because of the leaves and crackly bark). The Bears used a bench in their fort from the plane crash because we would be warmer sitting on the bench than on the ground. The Beavers used a lot of pine brush and had a Christmas tree because it is better at insulating us. After a few days, Isabelle found us and took us somewhere safe.

We had to fill different roles such as fort tester, pine brush and stick gatherer, scribe and data collector, stick stacker, firewood stacker. We got better at communicating as we continued to build the fort.


