WI 4-H Foundation 2020-2021 Arts Contest Dates Extended

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation is pleased to announce that we are **extending the deadline for the Foundation Art Contest until January 1, 2021**. We know that the beginning of the 4-H year has challenges, especially this year. Recognizing those time constraints, we wanted to extend the deadline to allow for more promotion within your county and the state arts programs.

We would appreciate any promotion you can do for the contest. To remind you the contest is open to ANY Wisconsin 4-H member. For more information go to: <u>Wis4HFoundation.org/events/celebrate-the-arts/</u>. Please feel free to share this information with colleagues we may have missed or those who might be interested.

Here are the details:

The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Art Contest is open to any current Wisconsin 4-H member with cash prizes totaling nearly \$1,000. **The contest will be held virtually, with photos of all entries submitted electronically through the 4-H entry portal (https://forms.gle/FCQSKVBowpru5J7H7)** no later than January 1.

A winner will be chosen in each category with a Best of Show award given to one entry chosen by the judging committee. Category winners will receive a \$100 cash award. The Best of Show entry will receive an additional \$150 cash award.


Although the contest is virtual, the winning art piece from each category and the Best of Show must be delivered to the nearest 4-H Office or the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation. The winning art pieces will become the property of the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation to be used to raise funds for 4-H arts and communication programs and will not be returned.

The contest will be broken into eight categories:

- 1. Drawing Using Any Medium
- 2. Painting (acrylic, watercolor or oil)
- 3. Pottery, Ceramics or Clay
- 4. Photography
- 5. Paper
- 6. Fabric, Yarn or Fiber
- 7. Wood

Any Other Media (ex: digital, metalcraft, jewelry, leatherwork, wax, eggshells, taxidermy, etc.)

To be eligible for the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Art Contest, youth must be a 4-H member enrolled in 4H Online for the 2020-2021 4-H Program Year. Entrants do <u>not</u> need to be enrolled in any specific project to participate.

2021 Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted

(December 8, 2020, Madison, WI) The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$15,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2021. To be considered for financial support, applications must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Monday, March 15, 2021.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2021-2022 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

The application is a one-page resume and a one page cover letter, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

Cover letters and resumes must be submitted as one PDF document and emailed to scholarships@wis4hfoundation.org. For detailed information about what to include in and how to prepare the application documents, 4-H youth can visit www.Wis4HFoundation.org/scholarships.

A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria.

Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.



Alyssa Frisch received a \$2,000 WI 4-H Foundation scholarship in 2020 to study mechanical engineering. She was a member of the New Directions 4-H Club in Columbia County.

Micah Stege received a \$2,000 WI 4-H Foundation scholarship in 2020 to study landscape maintenance and arboriculture. He was a Washington County 4-H member.


