What beauty we have seen the last couple of days in the Chippewa Valley! I have enjoyed seeing all of the photos of hoarfrost on barbedwire fences and pine trees posted on Facebook. What a wonderful example of 4-H Projects at work...

I have been busy working with colleagues to plan 4-H events and project learning. I am excited to announce that we have scheduled a virtual Speaking and Demonstration Festival for February 25. See page 5 for guidelines and registration link. This is part of our usual Tri-County Performing Arts Festival. We are considering what we can do for the Drama and Music sections while following current gathering guidelines. We think that the best option would be for a "Tri-County We've Got Talent" in April or May. This would allow family-based music, drama, and other talent submissions. Watch for more details.

There is also an Arts & Craft mini camp scheduled for Feb 23-March 16. Registration is on page 8. Further mini camps are being planned in STEM and photography. Watch for details on those.

We have begun talking about summer camp. We do not know if it will be safe to hold an overnight camp. We will have guidance for summer programming on April 1. If we can have an overnight camp, we will do so at Beaver Creek from June 7-10. If overnight camps cannot be conducted safely, we are planning on holding several days of day-camps at a more central location. We will need camp counselors for either situation. Demonstration & Speaking Contest

Helping people speak in front of groups is one of the most important life skills 4-H offers. One of the best ways to help 4-H members prepare for the future is by helping them to become better public speakers & demonstrators. With this in mind, we would like all clubs to work together to stress the importance of speaking & demonstrations. Speaking and demonstrating using virtual platforms are likely to remain relevant skills for decades to come. This year we will be holding the Speaking and Demonstration portion of the Chippewa, Dunn and Eau Claire Counties Performing Arts Festival via the Zoom online platform. After you register, you will be sent an invitation with your time and a link to the festival. You will be welcomed and then when the judge is ready for you, you will be moved into a breakout room to introduce yourself to the judge and to perform. Judges will be able to spend a few minutes talking to you about your performance.

4-H Demonstration

The ability to demonstrate is an important speaking skill. Demonstrating means that you show how to do or make something while you talk. Here are some tips:

- Select something that you do well
- Make attractive posters/backgrounds, or make use of a slide deck tool like Power-Point. Use large letters and space them so that they are easy to read.
- Assemble all materials necessary to complete your demonstration.
- Demonstrate as you talk. Be sure to look at the camera so that your audience can see your expressions and those who may have trouble hearing can lip read.
- Show the finished product.
- Summarize the steps of the demonstration.

DEMONSTRATION DIVISION

This segment of the festival is judged by certified judges and eligible for fair premiums.

Age categories and time limits:

Cloverbuds (K-2) - maximum time: 3 minutes

3rd & 4th Grade: 4-5 minutes 5th & 6th Grade: 5-8 minutes 7th & 8th Grade: 6-10 minutes 9th Grade & Up: 8-15 minutes

The categories listed below are types of demonstrations that can be done in the contest. You may enter more than one category. You may also enter as an individual and/or as a team in each category. NOTE: If you choose to participate as a team, you will need to practice and perform virtually, unless you are members of one household.

<u>Formal Demonstrations</u> - involve showing and telling the audience how to make or do something. Presents information through <u>actions</u> with an explanation. These should have an introduction, body, conclusion, and a time to answer questions. Length is determined by your age group (see above).

<u>Illustrated Talk</u> - Presents information with the use of visual aids such as maps, charts, posters, graphs, pictures, slides, or models. These should have an introduction, body, conclusion, and time to answer questions. Length is determined by age group (see above).

Recognition:

- All Demonstration Contest participants will receive a fair ribbon.
- Certificates will be awarded for each participant.
- Fair premiums will be offered to all participants, per individual county rules. You MUST enter your demonstration on your county fair form this summer to receive a premium.

Team demonstrations will be awarded a premium double the amount of the individual premium. These premiums will be paid along with your regular county fair check. The deadline to register_is **February 10, 2021.** Please note that late entries will NOT receive fair premiums.

SPEAKING DIVISION

The following are four categories and rules (enter any or all):

Original Speech

Cloverbuds: up to 1 minute (Grades K-2)

Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)

Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

1. Talk must be developed by the member who is presenting it. It cannot have been given previously in another contest or previously critiqued.

2. Only Cloverbud & Novice division speakers may have their speeches written out and read them. Junior through Senior division speakers should use note cards.

Interpretive Reading

Cloverbuds: Up to 1 minute (Grades K-2)

Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)

Intermediate: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7 & 8)

Senior: 4-6 minutes (Grades 9-13)

Rules:

1. Readings may be either prose, poetry, original, or a selected reading. If not original, the author should be credited.

- 2. All readers should use full-size copies of their selections (**NO** notecards). Please mount your copy on construction paper or other heavy paper (8 ½ x 11" or 9 x 12"). Do NOT read your selection from the book.
- 3. Create an introduction to introduce your reading.

<u>4-H Promotion</u> - Your chance to promote 4-H. Tell why you are involved and why others should join. Props or visual aids are optional.

Novice: 1-2 minutes (Grades 3 & 4) Junior: 2-3 minutes (Grades 5 & 6)

Intermediate & Senior: 3-4 minutes (Grades 7-13)

<u>Dynamic Duo</u> - For a team of two - may be two 4-H members of any age or combination of ages or a 4-H member and an adult. This is an interpretive reading consisting of a dialogue for two. Up to 6 minutes in length. This year, since we are virtual, this could be a great sibling entry.

Each participant will receive a participation ribbon and a certificate. A top overall speaker in each age division will be selected and receive a trophy (across all entry divisions).

4-H Projects

4-H engages youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their interests and passions, ultimately mastering new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a project?

A project is simply a topic area that sparks a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:

- Animal Sciences
- Arts & Communication
- Community Involvement
- Cultural Projects
- Family, Home, & Health
- Outdoor Education (Natural Sciences)
- Plant & Soil Sciences



A tenth project area is specifically for grades K-2, known as Cloverbuds. It is intended to be more developmentally appropriate for our youngest members.

What resources are available?

Each county's 4-H program differs in how project learning opportunities are offered. Some programs offer countywide, short-term workshops. Others may have countywide programs with set dates and meeting locations. Some 4-H clubs may have adults specifically devoted to certain project areas.

What if my county or club doesn't offer a project?

Anywhere can a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from shop4-h.org or your local Extension office.



Project leaders provide a safe environment to learn about a project area in which they have experience. Adults can volunteer as a project leader to share their specialized skill set with youth!

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2020-2021 Essay Contest for 4th and 5th Grade Students Presented by Wisconsin Farm Bureau's Ag in the Classroom

How have Wisconsin soybean farmers fueled Wisconsin's economy?

This year's essay contest topic is "How have Wisconsin soybean farmers fueled Wisconsin's economy?" Our 2021 Book of the Year is "Full of Beans- Henry Ford Grows a Car" by Peggy Thomas. The book and essay topic allow students to explore how soybeans can be used in so many ways including food, animal feed, energy, cars and much more! The book shares how Henry Ford used soybeans not only in cars, but in his clothes, and food. All rules, promotional materials, county Farm Bureau essay contest coordinator's info, lessons and activities, and other resources related to the essay contest and book program can be found at www.wisagclassroom.org. Books must be ordered online through the website store.

Contest Rules:

- The essay contest is open to 4th and 5th grade students in public schools, private schools, and home school programs. Students involved in 4-H, PALS and after school programs are also encouraged to participate.
- Essays must be handwritten in ink or be computer generated. They must be single-sided and fit on one sheet of paper.
- The essay must be between 100 to 300 words in length.
- Essays will be judged on content (50 points), grammar and spelling (25 points) and originality and creativity (25 points).
- Essays must include: student's name, grade level, parent's name, teacher's name, school name and address, school phone number, teacher's email address and county on the back of the essay. Please do not identify the student on the front side.
- Entry deadline Postmarked by April 1, 2021 and sent to the county essay coordinator:



2021 Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted

(December 8, 2020, Madison, WI) The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$15,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2021. To be considered for financial support, applications must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Monday, March 15, 2021.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2021-2022 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

The application is a one-page resume and a one page cover letter, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

Cover letters and resumes must be submitted as one PDF document and emailed to scholarships@wis4hfoundation.org. For detailed information about what to include in and how to prepare the application documents, 4-H youth can visit www.Wis4HFoundation.org/scholarships.

A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria.

Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.



Alyssa Frisch received a \$2,000 WI 4-H Foundation scholarship in 2020 to study mechanical engineering. She was a member of the New Directions 4-H Club in Columbia County.

Micah Stege received a \$2,000 WI 4-H Foundation scholarship in 2020 to study landscape maintenance and arboriculture. He was a Washington County 4-H member.



"Season's Greetings"

Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Friends,

The year is wrapping up and hopefully many of you were able to use some unexpected free time to pursue your wildlife interests!

There is already a thin layer of ice on the pond down the road. I often see turtles sunning themselves on logs throughout the year but I wondered what they do as the weather turns. Turtles instinctively know how to prepare for winter. When air and water temperatures start to drop, turtles will slow their metabolisms and look for a place to hole up for winter. Different types of turtles prefer different types of homes: water-loving turtles will swim to the bottom of the pond while land-

based turtles, like a box turtle will burrow in the dirt or mud at or near the pond surface. Just like fish, turtles will stop eating as their metabolism naturally slows to a cold-weather crawl. They'll start to hibernate - or brumate, as termed in herpatology when they'll require very little oxygen, their heart rate will slow to just a few beats per minute and they'll sleep the winter away. Did you read about the bears spotted in Richfield on November 17? (HOMEWORK - Where is Richfield?) OWisconsin's occupied bear range is expanding, which means residents can expect to see black bears in areas outside of the bear's traditional range. Wisconsin's black bear population is considerably higher than it was 30 years ago. The female black bear can weigh up to two hundred pounds. The male is larger weighing in at around four hundred pounds. Their height and length are around the same amount for both sexes. The height averages around three feet up to the shoulders and the length is approximately four to six feet. They typically hibernate from September through April. Black bears have excellent vision and are good swimmers. They can live to be thirty-three years old. Source: Black bear population status and distribution | Wisconsin DNR

- 2-Craft Craft item has wildlife or forestry connection. Examples: leather craft, stitchery, clothing, sculpture, wildlife folk art, plaster tracks, quiver, etc. Craft items must be made by exhibitor during the current 4-H year. (Do not use "put together craft kits" or similar items.)
- 3-Drawing Drawing can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife, forestry, or wildlife habitat connection. Francine then gave the leaders' report where she reminded everyone of the following:


- To sign up on 4-H online
