Demonstration & Speaking Contest

Helping people speak in front of groups is one of the most important life skills 4-H offers. One of the best ways to help 4-H members prepare for the future is by helping them to become better public speakers & demonstrators. With this in mind, we would like all clubs to work together to stress the importance of speaking & demonstrations. Speaking and demonstrating using virtual platforms are likely to remain relevant skills for decades to come. This year we will be holding the Speaking and Demonstration portion of the Chippewa, Dunn and Eau Claire Counties Performing Arts Festival via the Zoom online platform. After you register, you will be sent an invitation with your time and a link to the festival. You will be welcomed and then when the judge is ready for you, you will be moved into a breakout room to introduce yourself to the judge and to perform. Judges will be able to spend a few minutes talking to you about your performance.

4-H Demonstration

The ability to demonstrate is an important speaking skill. Demonstrating means that you show how to do or make something while you talk. Here are some tips:

- Select something that you do well
- Make attractive posters/backgrounds, or make use of a slide deck tool like PowerPoint. Use large letters and space them so that they are easy to read.
- Assemble all materials necessary to complete your demonstration.
- Demonstrate as you talk. Be sure to look at the camera so that your audience can see your expressions and those who may have trouble hearing can lip read.
- Show the finished product.
- Summarize the steps of the demonstration.

DEMONSTRATION DIVISION

This segment of the festival is judged by certified judges and eligible for fair premiums.

Cloverbuds (K-2) - maximum time: 3 minutes 3rd & 4th Grade: 4-5 minutes 5th & 6th Grade: 5-8 minutes 7th & 8th Grade: 6-10 minutes 9th Grade & Up: 8-15 minutes

The categories listed below are types of demonstrations that can be done in the contest. You may enter more than one category. You may also enter as an individual and/or as a team in each category. NOTE: *If you choose to participate as a team, you will need to practice and perform virtually, unless you are members of one household.*

<u>Formal Demonstrations</u> - involve showing and telling the audience how to make or do something. Presents information through <u>actions</u> with an explanation. These should have an introduction, body, conclusion, and a time to answer questions. Length is determined by your age group (see above).

<u>Illustrated Talk</u> - Presents information with the use of visual aids such as maps, charts, posters, graphs, pictures, slides, or models. These should have an introduction, body, conclusion, and time to answer questions. Length is determined by age group (see above).

Recognition:

- All Demonstration Contest participants will receive a fair ribbon.
- Certificates will be awarded for each participant.
- Fair premiums will be offered to all participants, per individual county rules. You MUST enter your demonstration on your county fair form this summer to receive a premium.

Team demonstrations will be awarded a premium double the amount of the individual premium. These premiums will be paid along with your regular county fair check. The deadline to register_is **February 10, 2021.** <u>Please note that late entries will NOT receive fair premiums.</u>

Doors to the Past

A Project of Oral History, Writing and Art

Overview: In partnership with Eau Claire County 4-H, Doors to the Past is a project presented by The Heartbeat Center for Writing, Literacy and the Arts – a nonprofit educational writing and arts program based in Osseo, Wisconsin. The project will guide participants to consider older people's histories through interviews, historical and creative writing, and visual arts.

Participants will use the information they gather from oral history interviews to create a door that reflects their chosen older person's history and personality. Those doors will be displayed during the Eau Claire County Fair and potentially at other venues.

Participants: The project primarily is for older 4-H members; younger members may participate with guidance of a parent, guardian or leader.

Introduction: Individuals' stories help teach us who we are and connect us to a heritage handed down across generations. When we listen closely, these stories can also be a resource for historical research. They can take us back (through memory) to the scene of pivotal events or give us a feel for the effects of broad social change while providing a uniquely personal insight into our nation's past.

Guiding Question: How has American history touched the members of our communities? What stories can our older community members add to our national saga? How does their experience shed light on our past?

These questions will be answered when you join us for 'Doors to the Past!'

Extension Eau Claire County is excited to work with the Heartbeat Center for Writing, Literacy, and the Arts to bring you Doors to the Past. Starting in March, we will meet virtually, and learn even more about this opportunity. Club leaders will be contacted and provided with more information to share at your February club meetings. Youth for the quality care of animals, YQCA is a mandatory requirement for all exhibitors showing any Beef, Dairy, Goat, Rabbit, Poultry, Sheep & Swine at the Eau Claire County Fair 2021.

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Fact Sheet

In the fall of 2017, Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) state program with the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program. This new and interactive program provides youth a number of options for an annual quality assurance youth certification. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects.

YQCA provides a common framework for food animal quality assurance programs which:

- Strengthen the youth educational experience,
- Improve the care of food animals, and
- Promote a higher level of consumer food safety.

This program allows youth to learn about other species of animals; not just the species they show. This program allows for the consistency of information being taught to youth in all states and in all species of animals.

YQCA content and modules demonstrate a progression of topic knowledge in designated age categories (Age as of January 1):

- Junior (8-11)
- Intermediate (12-14)
- Senior (15-18)
- Young Adult (19-21)

Each year, youth complete one new module in each the following categories:

- Animal Welfare (basic needs, proper animal handling, biosecurity, etc.),
- Food Safety (medications, medicated feeds, withdrawal times, avoiding residue, etc.)
- Character Education (ethics, goal setting, career exploration, etc.)

QUALITY CARESA

YQCA gives families more flexibility in gaining this required certification, which is more convenient to accommodate busy seasonal schedules. It's estimated that youth will spend roughly 60 minutes completing modules each year. Participating in the online program also saves money on fuel and food costs that can come with attending trainings.

YQCA illustrates the next generation of learning and can be offered to youth in a couple of ways:

- <u>Online curriculum</u> a youth exhibitor annually will complete three interactive online modules and corresponding quizzes. This is available 24/7 which allows exhibitors flexibility to take the course at their convenience.
- Face to face Trainer led program by either Extension personnel, Agri-Science teachers or veterinarians that have gone through a certification training.
- <u>Online Exam</u> upon passing an online youth member can achieve more than1 year of certification.

YQCA replaced Wisconsin's MAQA program and the National Pork Board Youth PQA program, both of which are no longer in existence. Wisconsin 4-H and FFA leaders are pleased to share their joint support of this program which was implemented in Wisconsin starting in the fall of 2017. In addition, Wisconsin State Fair and other national exhibitions required certification in YQCA for participation in 2018.

Why quality assurance education?

- The livestock industry and business are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products.
- All species organizations have quality assurance programs. BQA, FARM (Dairy), PQA, etc.
- Consumers are more interested in how and where their food is produced.
- United States exports a lot of pork and beef. If there is a poor experience, that market is lost and it impacts the whole industry.



Value of Quality Assurance Education?

- Most county programs provide education around grooming, showing and feeding.
 Very few offer specific information on the day to day management of animals, their facilities and their needs.
- This program also shares information related to sportsmanship, telling your story and young adult topics such as, stewardship, careers and hot topics in agriculture.
- Exhibitions and their partners value this education to minimize the incidence of unethical practices.
- Youth and parents are further removed from agriculture and how animals are raised and cared for.
- Need for consistent information from state to state.
- Wisconsin and Nebraska research indicates youth learn and put into practice what they gather from quality assurance education.

What is the cost?

- \$12/person/year for the online modules that are different each year.
- \$3/person/year for the face to face trainings.

Why the Cost?

- Online education increases cost due to managing the learning platform, however it increases the fun for the user and learning outcomes are greater.
- Development of creative modules where the information stays current.

Is YQCA required?

- Wisconsin State fair requires YQCA for Junior exhibitors for Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Dairy, Poultry and Rabbits.
- This certification is highly encouraged for all youth in the aforementioned animal projects in Wisconsin.
- Counties should require YQCA!
- Processing plants & marketing channels require it.
- State fair, national junior swine association shows and other national shows require it.
- Conversations occur on further requirements.
- This is an <u>annual</u> certification.

Special features:

- The program was heavily peer reviewed and reviewed for youth age appropriateness.
- The online system gives youth options to receive the material. The system will read the material to youth so they can hear it.
- Coupons can be purchased to minimize the cost. Examples are: Producer groups, leader's councils, FFA alumni programs, etc.

Exploring 4-H for New Families

4-H Projects

4-H engages youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their interests and passions, ultimately mastering new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a project?

A project is simply a topic area that sparks a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:

- Animal Sciences
- Family, Home, & Health
- Arts & Communication
- Outdoor Education

(Natural Sciences)

- Community Involvement
- Cultural Projects
- Plant & Soil Sciences

A tenth project area is specifically for grades K-2, known as Cloverbuds. It is intended to be more developmentally appropriate for our youngest members.

What resources are available?

Each county's 4-H program differs in how project learning opportunities are offered. Some programs offer countywide, short-term workshops. Others may have countywide programs with set dates and meeting locations. Some 4-H clubs may have adults specifically devoted to certain project areas.

What if my county or club doesn't offer a project?

Anywhere can a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from shop4-h.org or your local Extension office.



What is a project leader?

Project leaders provide a safe environment to learn about a project area in which they have experience. Adults can volunteer as a project leader to share their specialized skill set with youth!

2021 Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted

(December 8, 2020, Madison, WI) The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$15,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2021. To be considered for financial support, applications must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Monday, March 15, 2021.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2021-2022 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

The application is a one-page resume and a one page cover letter, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

Cover letters and resumes must be submitted as one PDF document and emailed to scholarships@wis4hfoundation.org. For detailed information about what to include in and how to prepare the application documents, 4-H youth can visit www.Wis4HFoundation.org/scholarships.

A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria.

Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.

"TRACKS" - February 2021

Participation in wildlife & forestry activities are open to all Wisconsin 4-H club members. You can be enrolled in any 4-H project and participate in the activities.

Wildlife WHEP & Forestry 4-H Friends,

Ice fishing makes up 1/4 the annual catch in Wisconsin. Bluegill and perch are the species most commonly caught in winter. To catch bluegill try fishing in shallow bays where the water is about four to eight feet deep. For bait, try a teardrop lure tipped with live insect larvae. Gently jig the lure up and down. Jig for perch at 35 feet. For bait, try small, live minnows or weighted ice flies and insect larvae. Because the temperatures are so cold the fish are moving slower making them easier to catch.

To get started ice fishing you will need an auger to bore a hole in the ice, an ice fishing pole, a tip up and a few jigs (type of lure). You can use a power or manual auger. Most pan fish will fit easily through a 6" hole while larger fish such as muskies will require a 10" hole. Ice fishing poles are generally much shorter than standard fishing poles. A tip up is a hands-free device that allows you to fish hands free. When a fish strikes the bait a submerged spool spins and trips a flag above the ice.

(Be sure to check ice conditions. A good rule of thumb is that ice should be at least 4" thick to walk on it, but ice thickness can vary so be sure to check more than one spot. And don't forget your fishing license!)

Speaking of fishing... The Winnebago system is home to one of the largest lake sturgeon populations in North America and hosts a unique winter spear fishery. It is one of only two locations where lake sturgeon can be harvested with a spear. The lake's sturgeon population is one of the most dense in the world. The first season on Lake Winnebago dates back to 1932; this year's season starts on Feb. 13 and will last 16 days - or until harvest caps are reached. Most fish are smoked or fried - or mounted. The largest sturgeon recorded to date was 7' long and weighed 143 pounds.

Spearers must purchase a license and the minimum age is 12 years old. The equipment is fairly specialized. Most spears are about 5-10' long, weigh 20-40 pounds and have five prongs on a head 9-12" wide. The spearhead is attached to a rope which is essential for pulling the fish out of the lake. A large hole is cut in the ice and decoy is used to lure the sturgeon up from the bottom of the lake.

A female sturgeon will not spawn until they are 20-34 years of age and a male begins spawning between 14 and 31 years. It takes a female 3-5 years to develop a set of eggs.

2-Craft – Craft item has wildlife or forestry connection. Examples: leather craft, stitchery, clothing, sculpture, wildlife folk art, plaster tracks, quiver, etc. Craft items must be made by exhibitor during the current 4-H year. (Do not use "put together craft kits" or similar items.)

3-Drawing - Drawing can be any size and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife, forestry, or wildlife habitat connection. 8-Photo Color - Your color photo (one only), any size, and does not need to be mounted that has a wildlife or forestry connection. Photo will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your brief description. No people allowed.

9-Recycle - Any item related to wildlife, forestry, or for wildlife use. Example - bird nesting material. Item will be judged on "story telling ability", practical usefulness, neatness, and your brief description.

10-Taxidermy – Item or display made 4-H member during the current 4-H year. Include date, location, and county where critter was obtained. Also, include a description of the critter and of your taxidermy work.

11-Trail Camera Photo – Large / Small Mammal – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera <u>after September 1^e of the previous year</u>. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

12-Trail Camera Photo – Upland Bird, Backyard Bird, Waterfowl, or Raptor – Photo from a trail camera can be any size and does not need to be mounted. Include animal name, date, location (county), and brief description of the picture. Also include the relationship of the camera's owner. Picture must have been taken with your immediate family or grandparents trail camera <u>after September 1^{se} of the previous year</u>. Photos will be judged on "story telling ability", neatness, and your description.

13-Tree or Shrub – Item, poster or display of a tree or shrub, parts, measurements, related insects, or diseases, etc. Include the tree/shrub name and description. Also, can be with an animal, insect, bird, or critter that makes their home in, on, or near a particular tree or shrub species. This entry may include items from the entire preceding calendar year.

14-WHEP or Forestry Concept - Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP or forestry Concept (or part of a concept) from the current national manuals. Include the concept name and a description. Examples: habitat requirements, stages, food chain, etc.

15-WHEP Foods - Item, diorama, poster, or display of a WHEP foods (or part of a food group) from the current national WHEP manual. Include the food group name and a description. Examples: aquatic plants, grains, soft mast, hard mast, etc.

<u>Purpose:</u> To promote youth involvement with Southdown sheep in Wisconsin by awarding youth with a quality registered ewe lamb to begin their flocks.

Who is Eligible?

1. Wisconsin youth ages 11-16 enrolled in 4-H or FFA who do not already own Southdown sheep.

Requirements/Rules:

- A written application must be submitted to the Wisconsin Southdown Association. Application materials are presented on page 2. Mail application materials postmarked by March 15, 2021 to Kelly Vierck, N5690 County Road M, Juneau, WI or emailed to rosehillsouthdowns@gmail.com.
- Applications will be reviewed by a Wisconsin Southdown Association appointed committee. Winner(s) will be selected based on quality of the application materials. The number of winners will be determined by the number of ewes donated in that year.
- The top applicants selected will be contacted by the Wisconsin Southdown Association Board of Directors for a phone interview, which will finalize the selection of the winners.
- 4. Winner(s) will be announced and animal(s) awarded at the Wisconsin Southdown Stars Sale & Symposium in April. Winner(s) will be contacted prior to the Sale and must be in attendance in order to receive the ewe lamb(s). Each winner will receive individual instruction on feeding and care of the ewe lamb and a mentor will be introduced who can be contacted any time for information and assistance. The mentor will report back to the Wisconsin Southdown Association from time to time on the progress of the winner in raising his or her ewe lamb.
- 5. The winner(s) of ewe lambs agree to maintain and raise their animals in clean facilities and provide appropriate care. The ewe lamb must receive proper annual vaccinations and receive deworming and necessary medications to maintain and assure good health. The ewe lamb must also receive proper nutrition (grain, supplement, hay, mineral and pasture) in order for it to grow to its full potential.
- 6. Each winner will be required to make a written progress report to the Wisconsin Southdown Association along with pictures of the ewe lamb due September 1, 2021. The ewe lamb must be shown at a minimum of 2 shows such as a local, county, or state fair or the Spring Preview or Sheep and Wool Festival shows.
- 7. Failure on the part of the youth who wins an ewe lamb to maintain it in good health, provide proper nutrition and good animal husbandry care will result in forfeiture of the ewe lamb back to the Wisconsin Southdown Association. All costs associated with feeding, caring and showing the ewe lamb are the sole responsibility of the youth winner. The Wisconsin Southdown Association assumes no responsibility or liability for the animal once it is delivered to the winner and is not required to replace the animal in the event of death.

 Donated ewe lambs must be of show ring quality and be in good health upon donation. Ewe lambs must adhere to the American Southdown Breeders Association's breed standards and DNA testing requirements.
