#### Hello fine 4-H families!

While this past year has not been easy, I am so proud of the fact that we have been able to provide meaningful programming to young people in a variety of ways. And, there has been collaboration across county lines in ways that is completely unprecedented. I have learned so much from my colleagues and have been blown away by their work. In the next two months, we are holding Art mini-camp, STEM mini-camp, Art U, Breads & Spreads mini-camp, Digging Deeper into 4-H, and a virtual speaking contest. More opportunities will be announced, soon. I hope that you are taking advantage of these programs. Even if you don't have a good internet connection, these activities can be done at home and promote learning and development.

And, I waited a few days to finish this newsletter because I was waiting for an update in the guidance from the state office. Starting with events being held on or after April 1, the following is true:

- Increase total event participants to 50 indoors (must maintain <30% of room capacity so might have to be less)
- Increase pod numbers to 20, with additional flexibility to have one large group if there is no safety reason to have participants in pods
- Increase length of indoor events to 4 hours

There are still nuances that I must clarify, but wanted to share the news that it will be much easier to hold meetings. Please continue to contact me to discuss meeting and program plans.

#### Doors to the Past

A Project of Oral History, Writing and Art

Overview: In partnership with Eau Claire County 4-H. Doors to the Past is a project presented by The Heartbeat Center for Writing, Literacy and the Arts – a nonprofit educational writing and arts program based in Osseo, Wisconsin. The project will guide participants to consider older people's histories through interviews, historical and creative writing, and visual arts.

Participants will use the information they gather from oral history interviews to create a door that reflects their chosen older person's history and personality. Those doors will be displayed during the Eau Claire County Fair and potentially at other venues.

Participants: The project primarily is for older 4-H members; younger members may participate with guidance of a parent, guardian or leader.

Introduction: Individuals' stories help teach us who we are and connect us to a heritage handed down across generations. When we listen closely, these stories can also be a resource for historical research. They can take us back (through memory) to the scene of pivotal events or give us a feel for the effects of broad social change while providing a uniquely personal insight into our nation's past.

Guiding Question: How has American history touched the members of our communities? What stories can our older community members add to our national saga? How does their experience shed light on our past?

These questions will be answered when you join us for 'Doors to the Past!'

Extension Eau Claire County is excited to work with the Heartbeat Center for Writing, Literacy, and the Arts to bring you Doors to the Past. Starting in March, we will meet virtually, and learn even more about this opportunity. Club leaders will be contacted and provided with more information to share at your February club meetings. ## **Learn By Doing**



Reprinted with permission from Iowa State University Extension and Outreach Since 4-H started in the early 1900s, the idea of "learning by doing" has defined the program. This hands-on process allows youth to understand not only how to do something but also why they're doing it. This model is known as the Experiential Learning

#### Failure is OK!

One of the biggest challenges (and benefits) of experiential learning is not always being successful immediately. It might be hard to sit back and watch your youth struggle, but it's a valuable lesson. 4-H is supposed to be a place where you can fail in a safe environment. Learning is a process—change from failure is ok!

Support your youth and encourage them! The first arrow in an archery lesson might miss the target, but you'll be amazed how your youth progresses after ten, fifty, one hundred more attempts.

#### Car Ride Questions

It's pretty common for 4-H members to share what they learned with their peers and the adults leading a project. The learning doesn't end when youth leave the activity and head home! Take time with your 4-H member to reflect on their experience. Ask some questions to see what they learned and to help them think critically about the activity they just did. Reflection is an important part of learning by doing, and you as a caregiver can help support the process. Here are some questions you could ask:

What was the easiest part of the activity? What surprised you?
What were some problems that came up over and over? How did you handle them?
What was the most challenging part of the activity? Why? How did you solve it?
What advice would you give to someone who wants to do this activity?
How can you use what you learned?




## **Origami Hearts**


Have you ever tried origami before? Origami is the art of paper folding. Try to make a heart out of a square piece of paper by following these steps! If you have questions or don't understand a step, ask an adult for help!



Start with a 6" x 6" square piece of paper. If you're using origami paper, put the side with the color pattern face down on the table.

Fold paper in half on the diagonal, bringing top corner to bottom one. Unfold. Fold in half again, bringing right corner to left one. Unfold.













#### How did it go?

Did you get it right the first time? If you did, great job! If you didn't, try it again! It's normal to not get an origami fold perfect on the first try. Try to see if you can perfect the skill. After you have this one down, try to create some other new folds!

<u>Summary of Position:</u> The 4-H Summer Intern will increase his/her knowledge of youth development programs, community partnerships, volunteer development, UW-Extension Service and 4-H Youth Development Agent responsibilities. This summer position provides valuable pre-professional experience for educational and community based careers. The 4-H Summer Intern is supervised by the Pierce County 4-H Youth Development Agent and the Area 5 Extension Director.

#### **Extension Office Responsibilities:**

#### Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Fact Sheet

In the fall of 2017, Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) state program with the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program. This new and interactive program provides youth a number of options for an annual quality assurance youth certification. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects.

YQCA provides a common framework for food animal quality assurance programs which:

- Strengthen the youth educational experience,
- Improve the care of food animals, and
- Promote a higher level of consumer food safety.

This program allows youth to learn about other species of animals; not just the species they show. This program allows for the consistency of information being taught to youth in all states and in all species of animals.

YQCA content and modules demonstrate a progression of topic knowledge in designated age categories (Age as of January 1):

- □ Junior (8-11)
- □ Intermediate (12-14)
- □ Senior (15-18)
- Young Adult (19-21)

Each year, youth complete one new module in each the following categories:

- Animal Welfare (basic needs, proper animal handling, biosecurity, etc.),
- Food Safety (medications, medicated feeds, withdrawal times, avoiding residue, etc.)
- Character Education (ethics, goal setting, career exploration, etc.)

YQCA gives families more flexibility in gaining this required certification, which is more convenient to accommodate busy seasonal schedules. It's estimated that youth will spend roughly 60 minutes completing modules each year. Participating in the online program also saves money on fuel and food costs that can come with attending trainings.

YQCA illustrates the next generation of learning and can be offered to youth in a couple of ways:

- Online curriculum a youth exhibitor annually will complete three interactive online modules and corresponding quizzes. This is available 24/7 which allows exhibitors flexibility to take the course at their convenience.
- Face to face Trainer led program by either Extension personnel, Agri-Science teachers or veterinarians that have gone through a certification training.
- Online Exam upon passing an online youth member can achieve more than 1 year of certification.

YQCA replaced Wisconsin's MAQA program and the National Pork Board Youth PQA program, both of which are no longer in existence. Wisconsin 4-H and FFA leaders are pleased to share their joint support of this program which was implemented in Wisconsin starting in the fall of 2017. In addition, Wisconsin State Fair and other national exhibitions required certification in YQCA for participation in 2018.

#### Why quality assurance education?

- The livestock industry and business are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products.
- All species organizations have quality assurance programs. BQA, FARM (Dairy), PQA, etc.
- Consumers are more interested in how and where their food is produced.
- United States exports a lot of pork and beef.
   If there is a poor experience, that market is lost and it impacts the whole industry.



#### Value of Quality Assurance Education?

- Most county programs provide education around grooming, showing and feeding.
   Very few offer specific information on the day to day management of animals, their facilities and their needs.
- This program also shares information related to sportsmanship, telling your story and young adult topics such as, stewardship, careers and hot topics in agriculture.
- Exhibitions and their partners value this education to minimize the incidence of unethical practices.
- Youth and parents are further removed from agriculture and how animals are raised and cared for.
- Need for consistent information from state to state
- Wisconsin and Nebraska research indicates youth learn and put into practice what they gather from quality assurance education.

#### What is the cost?

- \$12/person/year for the online modules that are different each year.
- \$3/person/year for the face to face trainings.

#### Why the Cost?

- Online education increases cost due to managing the learning platform, however it increases the fun for the user and learning outcomes are greater.
- Development of creative modules where the information stays current.

#### Is YQCA required?

- Wisconsin State fair requires YQCA for Junior exhibitors for Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Dairy, Poultry and Rabbits.
- This certification is highly encouraged for all youth in the aforementioned animal projects in Wisconsin.
- Counties should require YQCA!
- Processing plants & marketing channels require it.
- State fair, national junior swine association shows and other national shows require it.

- ★ With mostly black (dark) tones: Under-expose your image slightly. By MAKING IT DARKER, you'll see better highlight detail and better contrast in your image.
- ★ Focus on shapes and lines: Shadows shine in B&W photographs!
- ★ Focus on Textures: Maybe try a macro image of something with fine detail.
- ★ Subject matter is OPEN!
- ★ Try editing your image instead of just adding a filter.
- ★ If you're using a cell phone, check out the black & white filter options.

## **4-H Projects**

4-H engages youth in project-based education. Through project learning, youth can dive deeper into their interests and passions, ultimately mastering new skills. 4-H projects are meant to be hands-on to create a memorable learning experience.

What is a project?

A project is simply a topic area that sparks a youth's interest! Projects can be offered at a club or group setting, or on your own outside of the club. 4-H members are encouraged to enroll in only one or two projects for their first year. 4-H members in 3rd grade and higher are eligible to sign up for any 4-H project. Almost all 4-H projects can be divided into these nine broad project areas:



Anywhere can a great place for project learning where a trusted adult or older youth serves as the teacher. Project curriculum is available for many of the projects from shop4-h.org or your local Extension office.



#### 2021 Wisconsin 4-H Foundation Scholarship Applications Now Being Accepted

(December 8, 2020, Madison, WI) The Wisconsin 4-H Foundation will award more than \$15,000 in scholarships to outstanding Wisconsin 4-H members and alumni pursuing higher education in 2021. To be considered for financial support, applications must be received by the Wisconsin 4-H Foundation via email by Monday, March 15, 2021.

Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships are awarded to students based on demonstrated personal growth through 4-H, development and leadership in 4-H, academic performance and future educational goals.

To be eligible for Wisconsin 4-H Foundation scholarships students must have been a Wisconsin 4-H member for at least three years; have a grade point average of at least 2.5 on a 4.0 scale, and be enrolled or planning to enroll at a university, college or technical school during the 2021-2022 academic school year. Scholarship winners from previous years are not eligible to receive a second 4-H Foundation scholarship.

The application is a one-page resume and a one page cover letter, both of which give the 4-H youth a chance to share their 4-H achievements, as well as their future plans. Applicants are asked to treat this process as if applying for a job.

Cover letters and resumes must be submitted as one PDF document and emailed to scholarships@wis4hfoundation.org. For detailed information about what to include in and how to prepare the application documents, 4-H youth can visit www.Wis4HFoundation.org/scholarships.

A panel of experienced youth educators will screen the applications and select finalists. Applications chosen as finalists will be ranked by a second panel comprised of 4-H and youth development experts. The 4-H Foundation will assign available scholarships to the top-ranking applications based on scholarship criteria.

Applicants who are awarded scholarships will be notified by postal letter and email in May.



Alyssa Frisch received a \$2,000 WI 4-H Foundation scholarship in 2020 to study mechanical engineering. She was a member of the New Directions 4-H Club in Columbia County.

Absolutely! We all know that virtual programs are most effective in 40 minutes, so if you have too much content for one session, a series is great. We've also learned from our evaluation that participants enjoy seeing each other more than once and recognizing faces and names.

#### Is there a deadline to submit?

Nope. Programs are needed ongoing! Submission dates are weekly. After you submit, sessions will be reviewed by a committee of youth leaders, volunteers and staff using our Positive Youth Development learning review process adapted for virtual learning.

## I would like a little more information about Virtual Learning Community before I submit. Where can I go?

Fair enough. With the lessons learned, we have a new submission process, facilitator support resources, a uniform registration process, evaluation process and a plan for promotion and marketing. #### Wisconsin Southdown Association 2021 Southdown Ewe Lamb Award

<u>Purpose:</u> To promote youth involvement with Southdown sheep in Wisconsin by awarding youth with a quality registered ewe lamb to begin their flocks.

#### Who is Eligible?

Wisconsin youth ages 11-16 enrolled in 4-H or FFA who do not already own Southdown sheep.

#### Requirements/Rules:

- A written application must be submitted to the Wisconsin Southdown Association. Application materials are presented on page 2. Mail application materials postmarked by March 15, 2021 to Kelly Vierck, N5690 County Road M, Juneau, WI or emailed to rosehillsouthdowns@gmail.com.
- Applications will be reviewed by a Wisconsin Southdown Association appointed committee. Winner(s) will be selected based on quality of the application materials. The number of winners will be determined by the number of ewes donated in that year.
- The top applicants selected will be contacted by the Wisconsin Southdown Association Board of Directors for a phone interview, which will finalize the selection of the winners.
- 4. Winner(s) will be announced and animal(s) awarded at the Wisconsin Southdown Stars Sale & Symposium in April. Winner(s) will be contacted prior to the Sale and must be in attendance in order to receive the ewe lamb(s). Each winner will receive individual instruction on feeding and care of the ewe lamb and a mentor will be introduced who can be contacted any time for information and assistance. The mentor will report back to the Wisconsin Southdown Association from time to time on the progress of the winner in raising his or her ewe lamb
- 5. The winner(s) of ewe lambs agree to maintain and raise their animals in clean facilities and provide appropriate care. The ewe lamb must receive proper annual vaccinations and receive deworming and necessary medications to maintain and assure good health. The ewe lamb must also receive proper nutrition (grain, supplement, hay, mineral and pasture) in order for it to grow to its full potential.
- 6. Each winner will be required to make a written progress report to the Wisconsin Southdown Association along with pictures of the ewe lamb due September 1, 2021. The ewe lamb must be shown at a minimum of 2 shows such as a local, county, or state fair or the Spring Preview or Sheep and Wool Festival shows.
- 7. Failure on the part of the youth who wins an ewe lamb to maintain it in good health, provide proper nutrition and good animal husbandry care will result in forfeiture of the ewe lamb back to the Wisconsin Southdown Association. All costs associated with feeding, caring and showing the ewe lamb are the sole responsibility of the youth winner. The Wisconsin Southdown Association assumes no responsibility or liability for the animal once it is delivered to the winner and is not required to replace the animal in the event of death.

 Donated ewe lambs must be of show ring quality and be in good health upon donation. Ewe lambs must adhere to the American Southdown Breeders Association's breed standards and DNA testing requirements.


