

Wisconsin Farm Technology Days 2021 Will Award 3 Scholarships To Eau Claire County Area Students

EAU CLAIRE, WI (May 27, 2021) —Wisconsin Farm Technology Days 2021 today announced that three scholarships are available to Eau Claire County and surrounding area students for post high school agricultural training. While applications are due by August 20, 2021, all candidates must participate in the Eau Claire show that will be held July 20-22, 2021 at Huntsinger Farm, the largest producer and processor of horseradish in the country.

The three scholarship awards are for \$2,000, \$1000, and \$500 respectively among qualified applicants who have participated in Farm Technology Days since planning began.

Students interested in applying for the scholarships who have not yet participated in any of the planning for the Eau Claire show can find volunteer opportunities at https://www.wifarmtechdays.org/volunteers.

Eligibility Requirements:

- Applicants must take post high school agriculture related training, long or short course within the University of Wisconsin System or Wisconsin Technical College System. (This includes the study of Genetics, Landscape, Architecture, Biochemistry, Bacteriology, Food Industry, Horticulture, Environment Sciences, Agriculture Journalism, and other agriculture related fields of study.)
- Candidates for the scholarships must be an Eau Claire County or neighboring county resident and attend school in one of those counties. Neighboring counties are Chippewa County, Clark County, Jackson County, Trempealeau County, Buffalo County, Pepin County, and Dunn County.
- Candidate must be planning to enter their senior year of high school or 1st year of college at the time of application in the fall of 2021.
- Candidate rank in the upper 50% of the class preferred with a minimum grade point of 3.0. Please attach high school transcript with the application.

 Candidate must have participated in the Eau Claire County Wisconsin Farm Technology Days activities at some time during the period of 2018 through 2021.

About Wisconsin Farm Technology Days

Wisconsin Farm Technology Days is a three-day outdoor event showcasing the latest developments in production agriculture, including practical applications and recent research and technological developments. This is the only farm show of its size in the United States that is organized and run entirely by volunteers. As the largest outdoor agricultural event in the state, it welcomes more than 45,000 attendees, with more than 600 commercial and educational vendors. The first WFTD show was named Farm Progress Days and was held in Waupaca County in 1954.

About Agriculture in Eau Claire County

Agriculture works hard for Eau Claire County every day. Family-owned farms, food processors and agriculture-related businesses generate thousands of jobs and millions of dollars of economic activity while contributing to local income and tax revenues. Eau Claire County, though dominated by the dairy industry, raises everything from meat goats to milking sheep to apples, grapes and vegetables. The county has seen farm numbers rise, while farm acreage has declined to an average farm size of 155 acres. Migration from the city to rural areas has resulted in smaller farms producing a variety of products. A diverse population has created opportunities to fill ethnic and specialty food niches. Meanwhile, county institutions and farmers have joined forces to produce fresh, healthy products to meet a growing demand for local food.

Tractors are a valuable part of any farm business but can be unsafe if employees are not prepared with the right training. This course offers basic farm safety skills, proper tractor operations, connecting and using implements, and more. Get the job done more safely and efficiently!

Twelve-year-olds are eligible for a State of Wisconsin Certificate to drive tractors for their parents. Youth ages 13 and older are eligible for a Federal Certificate on their 14th birthday, allowing them to drive tractors for an employer. Youth involved in hazardous occupations other than on a farm operated by their parents must have a Certificate of Exemption from these regulations to engage in such employment.

*Eligible students must be 12 years old or older prior to the beginning of the course.



Tips for better photographs

- * Landmarks can be an awesome way to show off your hometown or state. Some landmarks like Mount Rushmore or the Mall of America are known worldwide; how can you show it in an unique way? There might be other landmarks, nature areas or historical sites that are only known to locals and should be seen by many other people.
- * Here are a few tips that may be helpful for this challenge:
 - Try to stand at an angle from a building, a statue or large equipment and include three sides so the viewers can tell that it is three dimensional.
 - Watch the backgrounds for extra clutter. Can you move to the left or right or higher/lower to eliminate clutter or unnecessary objects veering out from behind your subject.
 - Move in close to your subject to eliminate items that are not a part of the story you wish to tell, but not so close that you cut off part of it. Show the whole person including their feet or purposely just their head and shoulders.
 - It's okay to have people/cars in your landscape pictures to show how big or how far away the landscape is. They often add a point of interest for your eyes to land on.
 - If there is an object that could move in your picture, be sure to have more space in front rather than behind the object so it looks as if it has room to move forward (e.g. car, animal, person running or batting a ball).
 - Be respectful of monument, attraction and facility rules.

Virtual Learning Community Opportunities to Teach & Lead

*Virtual Learning Community – Opportunity to Teach and Lead in 2021

Across the Division of Extension we have been learning and improving our transition to virtual spaces. You haven't heard from the Virtual Learning Community since our Summer Virtual Learning Community, but Positive Youth Development in virtual spaces has continued to grow and develop. Since summer we've been building out virtual opportunities and had over 500 people registered for our first ever Virtual Fall Forum AND hundreds of volunteers registered and participated in our Virtual Annual Leader Trainings. In order to continue building out a community of learning around the state, we need Youth Leaders and Adult Volunteers!

Below are some commonly asked questions:

Why are we inviting YOU?

We have BIG DREAMS:

- provide high, quality virtual opportunities for youth and families across the state, Kindergarten-13th Grades and Adults
- involve **YOUTH** and adult leaders, staff and community partners in facilitating planned activities provide additional promotion for programs that are being offered across the state

What type of content are you looking for?

We are looking for project area content, leadership trainings and open spaces for youth to engage and connect around other topics/areas of interest. If you have an interest or passion and are willing to share it with others, we'll help make it work in a virtual space.

Does the session need to be new?

Nope. We know that many participants were just getting to know the calendar and as they did never attended all the sessions that might have interested them. Also, if you're like us, you've been learning and tweaking. If you have a program that you have already offered and are willing to offer it again, please do!

Can I submit more than one session?

Absolutely! We all know that virtual programs are most effective in 40 minutes, so if you have too much content for one session, a series is great. We've also learned from our evaluation that participants enjoy seeing each other more than once and recognizing faces and names.

Is there a deadline to submit?

Nope. Programs are needed ongoing! Submission dates are weekly. After you submit, sessions will be reviewed by a committee of youth leaders, volunteers and staff using our Positive Youth Development learning review process adapted for virtual learning.

I would like a little more information about Virtual Learning Community before I submit. Where can I go?

Fair enough. With the lessons learned, we have a new submission process, facilitator support resources, a uniform registration process, evaluation process and a plan for promotion and marketing. Our website can be found at https://4h.extension.wisc.edu/virtual-learning-community/.

Reflect and Record

The end of summer is a great opportunity to stop and reflect on the past 4-H year. Many 4-H members reflect on their successes, their challenges, and their experiences through a 4-H record book. Record books are presented in a variety of ways, sometimes through journals, videos, or slideshow presentations. All of these formats allow 4-H members to reflect on their project goals and determine how much progress was made over the past year.

Keeping record books throughout a 4-H career will help youth end up with a summary of all that they've done through their time in 4-H. This summary can be helpful when filling out job and college applications. Record books may also be helpful when applying for county scholarships or awards.



Developing Life Skills

Keeping records of work during a 4-H career helps to grow important life skills.

- » Self-reflection on experiences and accomplishments
- » Goal setting for the future
- » Planning and organizing a successful project or experience
- » Critical thinking when challenges arise or things don't go quite as planned
- » Budgeting time to meet deadlines and budgeting money to cover the cost of supplies

Adults can create space for youth reflection.

- » Help your youth consider what their goals were for the past year and determine if they met their own expectations.
- » Begin to consider goals for next year. Ask questions like, "If you were going to do things again, how would you do them differently?"
- » Reflect regularly with your youth about their experiences at meetings and events.
- » Take a lot of pictures. Photos and videos are great ways to record participation in activities while also recording achievements.
- » Set aside a few minutes every month for 4-H youth to fill out records.

Clubs and counties may offer awards for keeping high quality records. Check with your local club leader or county educator to learn more.

Track Your Progress
4-H members like you do awesome things every year. Keeping track of what you do in 4-H can help you to talk about your accomplishments with others. Many members keep track of what they did with a 4-H record book. Record books can be really helpful when you apply for college, jobs, or scholarships! If you are unsure of what record keeping your county does, ask your 4-H educator or a club advisor. A sample might be posted on your county webpage.

What should I record?

There's a lot that you can do in 4-H, so keeping track of everything might seem like a lot of work. If you answer "Yes" to any of these questions, you should include it in your record.

- Did you learn something?
- Did you complete a project?
- Did you accomplish a goal that you set for yourself?
- Did you receive an award or a scholarship?
- Did you travel somewhere with 4-H?
- Did you spend or receive money for your project?
- Did you make a presentation or give a speech?
- Did you participate in a club activity?
- Did you serve in a leadership role?

How do I record it?

Once you've got something to record, you have a lot of ways to keep track of it. Use whatever works best for you and the situation! You might use a mix of all of these things!

- Write your record on a piece of paper, and keep all the paper in a folder.
- Write all your records in a notebook.
- » Create a 4-H career scrapbook.
- Set aside a box for ribbons, photos, and all your records.
- Take a video of yourself where you talk about what you did.
- Type your records in an online document.



Completing a craft project or helping out with a club community service project are great things to include in your records!



If you store your records online, have an adult help you keep your information safe! It's always good to store an extra copy of your digital records somewhere.



Club officers should record their time spent learning to lead.

Records should always answer these questions:

- What did you do?
- 2. When did you do it?
- What did you learn along the way?
- 4. What important details do you want to remember?

Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) Fact Sheet

In the fall of 2017, Wisconsin replaced the MAQA (Meat Animal Quality Assurance) state program with the Youth for the Quality Care of Animals (YQCA) national program. This new and interactive program provides youth a number of options for an annual quality assurance youth certification. YQCA was created for youth in the Beef, Dairy, Goat, Poultry, Rabbit, Sheep, and Swine projects.

YQCA provides a common framework for food animal quality assurance programs which:

- Strengthen the youth educational experience,
- Improve the care of food animals, and
- Promote a higher level of consumer food safety.

This program allows youth to learn about other species of animals; not just the species they show. This program allows for the consistency of information being taught to youth in all states and in all species of animals.

YQCA content and modules demonstrate a progression of topic knowledge in designated age categories (Age as of January 1):

- Junior (8-11)
- □ Intermediate (12-14)
- □ Senior (15-18)
- Young Adult (19-21)

Each year, youth complete one new module in each the following categories:

- Animal Welfare (basic needs, proper animal handling, biosecurity, etc.),
- Food Safety (medications, medicated feeds, withdrawal times, avoiding residue, etc.)
- Character Education (ethics, goal setting, career exploration, etc.)

YQCA gives families more flexibility in gaining this required certification, which is more convenient to accommodate busy seasonal schedules. It's estimated that youth will spend roughly 60 minutes completing modules each year. Participating in the online program also saves money on fuel and food costs that can come with attending trainings.

YQCA illustrates the next generation of learning and can be offered to youth in a couple of ways:

- Online curriculum a youth exhibitor annually will complete three interactive online modules and corresponding quizzes. This is available 24/7 which allows exhibitors flexibility to take the course at their convenience.
- Face to face Trainer led program by either Extension personnel, Agri-Science teachers or veterinarians that have gone through a certification training.
- Online Exam upon passing an online youth member can achieve more than 1 year of certification.

YQCA replaced Wisconsin's MAQA program and the National Pork Board Youth PQA program, both of which are no longer in existence. Wisconsin 4-H and FFA leaders are pleased to share their joint support of this program which was implemented in Wisconsin starting in the fall of 2017. In addition, Wisconsin State Fair and other national exhibitions required certification in YQCA for participation in 2018.

Why quality assurance education?

- The livestock industry and business are constantly striving for high quality, wholesome products.
- All species organizations have quality assurance programs. BQA, FARM (Dairy), PQA, etc.
- Consumers are more interested in how and where their food is produced.
- United States exports a lot of pork and beef. If there is a poor experience, that market is lost and it impacts the whole industry.



Value of Quality Assurance Education?

- Most county programs provide education around grooming, showing and feeding.
 Very few offer specific information on the day to day management of animals, their facilities and their needs.
- This program also shares information related to sportsmanship, telling your story and young adult topics such as, stewardship, careers and hot topics in agriculture.
- Exhibitions and their partners value this education to minimize the incidence of unethical practices.
- Youth and parents are further removed from agriculture and how animals are raised and cared for.
- Need for consistent information from state to state
- Wisconsin and Nebraska research indicates youth learn and put into practice what they gather from quality assurance education.

What is the cost?

- \$12/person/year for the online modules that are different each year.
- \$3/person/year for the face to face trainings.

Why the Cost?

- Online education increases cost due to managing the learning platform, however it increases the fun for the user and learning outcomes are greater.
- Development of creative modules where the information stays current.

Is YQCA required?

- Wisconsin State fair requires YQCA for Junior exhibitors for Beef, Sheep, Swine, Goats, Dairy, Poultry and Rabbits.
- This certification is highly encouraged for all youth in the aforementioned animal projects in Wisconsin.
- Counties should require YQCA!
- Processing plants & marketing channels require it.
- State fair, national junior swine association shows and other national shows require it.
- Conversations occur on further requirements.
- This is an annual certification.

Special features:

- The program was heavily peer reviewed and reviewed for youth age appropriateness.
- The online system gives youth options to receive the material. The system will read the material to youth so they can hear it.
- Coupons can be purchased to minimize the cost. Examples are: Producer groups, leader's councils, FFA alumni programs, etc.
