Collaborate with Highground Veterans Memorial

The Highground Veterans Memorial Park in Neillsville, WI will be hosting a "WWII Pacific Theater" exhibit December 2021-March 2022. They could use our help, either as a club or an individual family.

- 1. Learn about the story of Japanese girl who folded paper cranes that are now a symbol used throughout the world for "peace." Fold Paper Cranes using the instructions on the following two pages.* Drop them off at the Extension office by Nov 1. They will be displayed throughout the exhibit in the traditional strings of 40 birds. Donating groups will be credited. (We have 40 to donate from camp, but I would love to send more.)
- 2. Create a fact sheet or poster display on the following: The experiences of the Japanese that were in America at the time of WWII (the Japanese internment camps that were in the U.S.), Japanese civilians that were affected by the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki; U.S. military personnel that fought in the Pacific Theater (maybe someone from their hometowns). These would be displayed and would be a great way to connect with the Highground's visitors and learn more about this unique part of our history.



Instructions





1.Start with a square piece of paper, fold it in half to make a triangle, then open out and make a triangle the other way.Open the paper flat again and turn it over, fold in half first to make a wide rectangle and then a tall rectangle. Make all the creases very sharp and precise. Open it out again.

Bring the 4 comers together, using the folds you have made to form a flat square shape. There will be one end which is open and where all the comers meet, this should be facing you.














3.Fold the side comers to the middle and the top comer down to make sharp folds. Open it out back to the square.

4. Lift up the top layer of the bottom comer and bring it high up, tuck the sides of that layer in to form a long diamond shape on top of a square behind. Turn over and repeat step 3 and 4 on the other side. You should now have a long diamond shape with 'legs' facing you.





















7.Now do another book fold. This folds the neck and tail inside the wings.

Pull the neck and tail out and redo the crease at the base of the crane to hold them in this position. Now fold one end down to form a head, and fold the wings down.








9. Open out your crane gently and it is ready to fly.

2021 Wisconsin Make It With Wool Competition

The Wisconsin Make It With Wool competition is a sewing and fashion design competition using wool or wool blend fabrics to create clothing and novelty items that showcase the beauty and versatility of wool.

The competition is open to all Wisconsin residents and will take place at the Wisconsin Sheep and Wool Festival on Saturday, September 11, 2021. There are two competitions to enter.

Garment Competition

Contestants select, construct and model their garments at the Make It With Wool Style Show. Garments may include a dress, jumper, jacket, coat, cape, shirt, vest, sweater, skirt, pants or shorts. Entries are split into age divisions and are judged on appropriateness to contestants lifestyle, construction quality, coordination of fabrics with style of garment, creativity, and wool promotion/marketability. Fabrics and yarns must be tested prior to the competition and must be at least 60% wool to qualify for the contest.

Novelty Competition

Contestants can create a wide variety of items using wool in this category, including but not limited to slippers, purse, scarf, shawl, hat, mittens, rugs, quilts.

Entries must be postmarked by August 8, 2021.

Wisconsin Farm Technology Days 2021 Will Award 3 Scholarships To Eau Claire County Area Students

EAU CLAIRE, WI (May 27, 2021) —Wisconsin Farm Technology Days 2021 today announced that three scholarships are available to Eau Claire County and surrounding area students for post high school agricultural training. While applications are due by August 20, 2021, all candidates must participate in the Eau Claire show that will be held July 20-22, 2021 at Huntsinger Farm, the largest producer and processor of horseradish in the country.

The three scholarship awards are for \$2,000, \$1000, and \$500 respectively among qualified applicants who have participated in Farm Technology Days since planning began.

Students interested in applying for the scholarships who have not yet participated in any of the planning for the Eau Claire show can find volunteer opportunities at https://www.wifarmtechdays.org/volunteers.

Eligibility Requirements:

- Applicants must take post high school agriculture related training, long or short course within the University of Wisconsin System or Wisconsin Technical College System. (This includes the study of Genetics, Landscape, Architecture, Biochemistry, Bacteriology, Food Industry, Horticulture, Environment Sciences, Agriculture Journalism, and other agriculture related fields of study.)
- Candidates for the scholarships must be an Eau Claire County or neighboring county resident and attend school in one of those counties. Neighboring counties are Chippewa County, Clark County, Jackson County, Trempealeau County, Buffalo County, Pepin County, and Dunn County.
- Candidate must be planning to enter their senior year of high school or 1st year of college at the time of application in the fall of 2021.
- Candidate rank in the upper 50% of the class preferred with a minimum grade point of 3.0. Please attach high school transcript with the application.

 Candidate must have participated in the Eau Claire County Wisconsin Farm Technology Days activities at some time during the period of 2018 through 2021.

About Wisconsin Farm Technology Days

Wisconsin Farm Technology Days is a three-day outdoor event showcasing the latest developments in production agriculture, including practical applications and recent research and technological developments. This is the only farm show of its size in the United States that is organized and run entirely by volunteers. As the largest outdoor agricultural event in the state, it welcomes more than 45,000 attendees, with more than 600 commercial and educational vendors. The first WFTD show was named Farm Progress Days and was held in Waupaca County in 1954.

About Agriculture in Eau Claire County

Agriculture works hard for Eau Claire County every day. Family-owned farms, food processors and agriculture-related businesses generate thousands of jobs and millions of dollars of economic activity while contributing to local income and tax revenues. Eau Claire County, though dominated by the dairy industry, raises everything from meat goats to milking sheep to apples, grapes and vegetables. The county has seen farm numbers rise, while farm acreage has declined to an average farm size of 155 acres. Migration from the city to rural areas has resulted in smaller farms producing a variety of products. A diverse population has created opportunities to fill ethnic and specialty food niches. Meanwhile, county institutions and farmers have joined forces to produce fresh, healthy products to meet a growing demand for local food.

Virtual Learning Community Opportunities to Teach & Lead

*Virtual Learning Community – Opportunity to Teach and Lead in 2021

Across the Division of Extension we have been learning and improving our transition to virtual spaces. You haven't heard from the Virtual Learning Community since our Summer Virtual Learning Community, but Positive Youth Development in virtual spaces has continued to grow and develop. Since summer we've been building out virtual opportunities and had over 500 people registered for our first ever Virtual Fall Forum AND hundreds of volunteers registered and participated in our Virtual Annual Leader Trainings. In order to continue building out a community of learning around the state, we need Youth Leaders and Adult Volunteers!

Below are some commonly asked questions:

Why are we inviting YOU?

We have BIG DREAMS:

- provide high, quality virtual opportunities for youth and families across the state, Kindergarten-13th Grades and Adults
- involve **YOUTH** and adult leaders, staff and community partners in facilitating planned activities provide additional promotion for programs that are being offered across the state

What type of content are you looking for?

We are looking for project area content, leadership trainings and open spaces for youth to engage and connect around other topics/areas of interest. If you have an interest or passion and are willing to share it with others, we'll help make it work in a virtual space.

Does the session need to be new?

Nope. We know that many participants were just getting to know the calendar and as they did never attended all the sessions that might have interested them. Also, if you're like us, you've been learning and tweaking. If you have a program that you have already offered and are willing to offer it again, please do!

Can I submit more than one session?

Absolutely! We all know that virtual programs are most effective in 40 minutes, so if you have too much content for one session, a series is great. We've also learned from our evaluation that participants enjoy seeing each other more than once and recognizing faces and names.

Is there a deadline to submit?

Nope. Programs are needed ongoing! Submission dates are weekly. After you submit, sessions will be reviewed by a committee of youth leaders, volunteers and staff using our Positive Youth Development learning review process adapted for virtual learning.

I would like a little more information about Virtual Learning Community before I submit. Where can I qo?

Exploring 4-H for New Families



Preparing for the New 4-H Year



The 4-H year officially begins in October each year. Even though the program year begins in October, 4-H enrollment begins in September. Counties in Wisconsin usually have an enrollment "deadline." This deadline can be the cutoff for determining who can represent 4-H at certain events.

No matter the date of your local deadline, re-enrolling in 4-H through the 4-H Online portal as soon as possible ensures that you receive all 4-H communications and other important program news.

Adding, Dropping, or Keeping Projects

Enrollment is the perfect time to add or remove projects in your 4-H Online profiles. 4-H members usually continue with the same projects from the year before, and it's pretty normal to add one or two new ones as well! First year members are recommended to only select one or two projects for their first year. The second year of membership is a great time to pick between three to five total projects.

Work with your youth to see what projects they liked, didn't like, or want to learn more about. There is nothing wrong if your member decides to keep the same projects from the year before!



Reminder: 4-H members in grades K-2 can only be signed up for the Cloverbud project!

Member Goals

On the opposite page, 4-H members are being challenged to write their personal 4-H goals for the new year. Setting goals can help with project selection, and it should help members plan out a path to success in the new 4-H year. See what goals your youth has chosen for the new 4-H year and identify ways to help them achieve those goals.

Family Member Goals

Have those in your family set goals as well! Goals might include attending more club meetings, helping at 4-H activities, or participating in certain county events. Try to find ways to keep 4-H as a togtherness activity!

Club Goals

Each year, 4-H clubs complete a Charter Renewal form. This form is usually completed by adult leaders and youth officers, but the charter might be talked about at a club meeting. Clubs are tasked with identifying club goals each year. Have your family brainstorm some S.M.A.R.T. goals for the club to strive for in the new year, such as planning an outreach event with a local community group or adding more welcoming activities for new families.

Setting Goals

Every year, many people create New Year's Resolutions. These resolutions are **goals** for the new year. Fall is the beginning of the new 4-H year, which makes it the perfect time to set goals for about what you want to do!

S.M.A.R.T. Goals

Goals are more likely to be successful when you give yourself something specific to aim for.

Any of your resolutions for the new 4-H year should be S.M.A.R.T.

Specific: Goals should be well defined and clear.

Measurable: This will help you know when you've been successful.

Achievable: Be realistic! Think of things that will challenge you but are still doable.

Relevant: Your goals should be important to you. Set goals that you want to complete!

Timely: Give yourself a specific time frame to complete your goals.

What are your goals?

Use this table to write goals that you want to accomplish in the new 4-H year. An example has been done for you. Notice that the example is S.M.A.R.T. See if you can find what parts of the goal are specific, measurable, attainable, relevant, and timely.

Tip: Use verbs in the action column. Often, 4-H goals are focused on things you want to learn, results you want to earn, or things you want to do.


The treasurer's report was read and was motioned by Charlie and seconded by Neveya

- * All lambs will be harvested and carcass data taken at UW-Madison Meats Lab
- * Carcasses judged as a PEN OF 3. (Payments for lambs harvested will be made directly to exhibitors.)
- * Live placings will be announced 1:00 p.m. Sunday in the Activity Center.
- * Carcass awards, along with data and indexing, will be listed online www.wisbc.com.
- * Premiums will be mailed directly to recipients.
- * Participants should be available for photos when placings are announced at Festival.

- RESERVE PENS ONLINE Pen reservations accepted until pen limit of 6 pens is reached. Entry Fees \$25 per pen. Entries accepted on a first-come-basis until pens are filled based on online entries. Limit – two pens per person making entry. Only those sheep for which pen fees have been paid will be permitted to be penned. Individual exhibitors receive one (1) gate pass to the festival.
- ELIGIBILITY Pen of Three Commercial Carcass Competition is open to wether and/or ewe lambs, commercial or purebred. The weight of each lamb at entry must be between 115 and 150 pounds.

PENNING: Lambs to be penned by 9 a.m. Sunday. Pens assigned by Coordinator.

FLEECE LENGTH: #1 pelts - (3/8" to 1" wool).

GENERAL: No muzzles, drenching, cold water baths, ice wraps, blanketing, patch shearing, coloring, or fitting permitted, (including legs). Lambs may not be tied in the pen.

- 3. HEALTH CERTIFICATES & INSPECTION All sheep will be inspected prior to unloading. Sheep originating from outside Wisconsin must be accompanied by a current certificate of veterinary inspection for interstate movement, to be submitted at check-in. Sheep showing any symptoms of contagious or infectious disease (sore mouth, ringworm, foot rot, pink eye, wool or club lamb fungus) will not be permitted to be unloaded or penned. All sheep entries must be identified with official, individual scrapie eartag ID.
- 4. DRUG WITHDRAWAL Persons entering lambs in the Pen of 3 Competition will be responsible for observing withdrawal times for all feed additives, antibiotics, de-wormers and vaccines. Evidence to the contrary at any stage of this competition may result in disqualification of lambs and/or carcasses and may cause an exhibitor to be banned from future competitions and the forfeiture of any and all premium or payments.
- 5. IDENTIFICATION All lambs entered must have birth dates recorded upon arrival. Only lambs born in exhibitor's flock in the year of event are eligible. Official scrapie/premise ID required.
- ALL PENS ASSIGNED Pens assigned by Carcass Competition Coordinator. Plan accordingly, no tack pens available. Pen cards will be provided. Entries accepted until limit of 6 pens is reached.

- FEEDING/CARE Feeding and care of lambs until they leave the grounds for harvesting is solely the
 responsibility of the exhibitor. Bedding (shavings) provided.
- JUDGING Lambs will be evaluated in their pens Sunday morning by a Judge appointed by the Pen of 3 Carcass Competition committee. Lambs are judged as a pen in both live and carcass evaluations.
- PAYMENTS Payment for lambs will be made by processor directly to exhibitor at the address on the entry form. Provide phone number.

10. CONTEST RESULTS

LIVE PEN PLACING – Will be determined by the live judge based on an evaluation of all three lambs in the pen and will be announced at Wisconsin Sheep & Wool Festival.

CARCASS PEN PLACING — Will be based on the average carcass placing of each carcass within a pen. Carcass pen placing ties will be broken by the average carcass index of lambs in the pen.

11. AWARDS

A traveling trophy for the 1st place pen will be awarded at the next Annual Meeting of the Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative. Monetary premiums will be paid on both live and carcass pens. If the 1st place carcass pen is also the 1st place live pen, an additional premium will be awarded.

- 12. RIGHT TO USE DATA The Wisconsin Sheep Breeders Cooperative reserves the right to record, photograph or otherwise utilize and/or share data and information from any and all Pen of 3 Carcass Competition entries.
- 13. TRANSPORTATION Transportation of lambs to the processor will be provided by the Festival, arranged by the Pen of 3 Carcass Competition Committee, unless any disqualification shall cause an exhibitor to be required to remove entries from the Festival grounds.
- 14. LIABILITY All Festival regulations shall apply.
