Through this experience, campers will gain independence, practice making new friendships, and try a variety of activities to build their confidence and make relationships across seven county's 4-H programs.

A training for 4-H Club treasurers and club leaders where they learned how to correctly fill out the required form for 4-H Annual Financial Reports. This event was created to increase understanding of 4-H financial policies, improve on-time submission of the Annual Financial Report, and decrease the number of errors on submitted reports.

Horticulture

Planning for a statewide webinar series for consumer horticulture audiences where participants will learn about pollinator decline, climate change and environmental contamination and pollution. The goal of this effort is to increase adoption of horticultural practices addressing identified environmental issues in Wisconsin

The goal is to increase decision-making and problem-solving skills, improve the productivity / health of gardens and landscapes, and to implement gardening practices that have a positive impact on the environment.

The goals of this program are to teach kids how to food garden, connect them to the natural world and promote life-long healthy eating habits.

Agriculture

Planning for bi-annual Midwest Manure Summit for farmers, managers, agronomists, engineers, nutrient management consultants, manure haulers, consultants, and other agri-business professionals. The goal of this effort is to teach individuals the latest, unbiased, university-based research on manure handling technologies, so that they can improve environmental sustainability and increase farm business viability.



Planning the 2022 Autumn Emergency Livestock Transport Response (PELTR) hybrid courses to increase economic sustainability of a local area's emergency plan for roadside incidents involving livestock trailers.

Planning for a virtual symposium in 2022 for swine producers where they increase knowledge of using technology, improving ventilation, the importance of biosecurity, and changes in nutrition (additional topics to be determined and finalized). The goal of the seminar is to increase decision-making skills for increasing profitability.

Health & Well-Being

A nutritional education lesson for women in transitional housing where they learned about meal planning and food shopping tips. The goal of this effort is to help participants make healthy food choices on a limited budget.

A collaborative effort with Chronic Disease Prevention Action Teams under the Eau Claire Healthy Communities, Health Dunn Right, and Chippewa Health Improvement Partnership coalitions to promote our 2022 Summer Activity Passport. This effort helps promote community engagement in summer activities that promote increased physical activity, increased fresh produce access and consumption, and stress reduction as action steps to reduce chronic diseases.

Collaboration with Boys and Girls Clubs of the Chippewa Valley-Eau Claire, Chippewa Falls, and Menomonie in providing a summer garden nutrition education series. This effort will introduce youth to gardening, promote fresh produce, and provide opportunity for youth to increase produce consumption.

Monthly meetings with the Chronic Disease Prevention Action Teams under the Eau Claire Healthy Communities, Health Dunn Right, and Chippewa Health Improvement Partnership coalitions. This effort helps guide the action teams in providing community awareness and activities concerning healthy food access, food security, and increased physical activity for local families.

Collaboration with local agencies to create sustainability and promotion of the farmers markets token and match programs. This effort enables FoodShare participants to utilize their benefits in purchasing market foods while supporting increased vendor sales.

Human Development & Relationships

Planning and development of digital parenting resources for parents/caregivers in collaboration with familyserving professionals. This effort is designed to support family stability and resiliency while increasing social emotional development in children.



Planning and development of parenting and early literacy programming to expand into laundromats serving small and rural communities. This effort is designed to support family stability, resiliency, and build community capacity.

Planning for literacy resources for HMoob-speaking individuals where educators will develop posters/informational flyers around early literacy strategies for families. This effort is designed to support family stability and resiliency.

A coaching program for families and individuals, where participants learn how to create financial goals and gain money management skills. The goal of this program is to enable participants to prepare for and take charge of household financial situations that occur due to changes in income or unforeseen hardships.

An article for parents of preschoolers where they learned what toddlers go through developmentally, how to build confidence and love, and stay connected to a rapidly growing and changing child. This effort is designed to support family stability and resiliency.

Community Development

Planning a grant 101 workshop to support businesses and nonprofits. The goal is to build the capacity of business owners and nonprofits to in their skillsets. The workshop is a collaboration with other Extension educators.

An educational Extension booth at the Wausau Hmong Festival to promote Extension resources to the underserved Hmong community and farmers from throughout the State. The goal was to promote Extension to the general Hmong community and to identify underserved farmers, which allows us to create a list for anticipated focus groups or workshops.

Planning a statewide conference to support a Hmong economic development summit. The goal is to build a network of underrepresented entrepreneurs and business owners to learn and support one another.

The tour is an exciting opportunity for our Hmong speaking farmers to learn about the use of high tunnels in their farm operations, but also raise awareness of funds supporting its purchase using the USDA Eqip program. The DATCP Produce Safety Team will also provide food safety rules and will also be part of the tour.

This month was also the last of Extension's New Colleague Onboarding cohort 10, and it was a great orientation opportunity to get to know more about Extension services, staff, and other valuable things to know. The orientation was completed over multiple virtual sessions including two in-





person meetings starting in February through June. It was great to meet other new hires and learn together as we start our careers with Extension.
