2023 Shooting Sports Startup Meeting

MANDATORY MEETING FOR MEMBERS AND PARENTS

Date: Thursday, January 5th Time: 6:30pm Location: North Star Middle School, 2711 Abbe Hill Drive, Eau Claire

This will be a very important meeting to discuss safety issues that are imperative in shooting sports. We will also explain the roles and responsibilities that we will all be sharing in this project; from the leaders & youth leaders, to the youth members, to the parents.

Parents, you will need to be present at this meeting to get information about the parental consent forms, health & medical treatment forms, liability waiver forms and code of conduct forms with your child. Shooting Sports members must be at least 8 years old and in the third grade to participate in the program. We will be meeting at Banbury Place, Door 17. It has a 4h symbal on it.

Air rifle will be from January 17th - March 7th

Archery will be from March 14th -April 25th

We will have entry fee of \$15 per child. There will be a \$50 deposit for volunteering. If you or your child volunteers, you will receive your money back at the end of the year.

Shooting Sports members can participate in competitive shoots around the state. Eau Claire County hosted our first competitive shoot in 2014 and will be hosting again this year on April 22nd, other shoots usually held in our area are in Bloomer, River Falls, Marshfield, and Rice Lake. These events are great ways to learn more about shooting and the outdoors, as well as having fun meeting others involved in shooting sports.

Shooting sports instructor certification workshops are also held at various locations throughout the state. These are excellent opportunities for parents and other adults interested in teaching shooting sports to become certified and join our group of instructors. We need more instructors in our group to continue as well as expand opportunities. Volunteer instructors must also complete the 4-H Adult Leaders Certification. Outbound Travel Programs: Applications for Summer 2023 travel to Japan, South Korea, Costa Rica, and Taiwan are due **December 16**. Most programs are four weeks and open to youth ages 12-18. If you know of any interested young people in your county, please encourage them to find the application on our website (wi4hinternational.org) and to reach out if they need any help and/or support completing the application. Scholarships are available and we are willing to work with educators and applicants on fundraising ideas and plans.

Inbound Hosting: WI 4-H also plans to welcome 20-30 young people from Japan July 23-August 17, and possibly a smaller delegation from Costa Rica, Norway, and Mexico Mid-June- Mid July. The majority of delegates are between 12-16 years old and are matched with a family who has a young person of similar age and gender. More detailed information about the host family application process will be shared in the coming months. Please reach out if you are interested and/or know of a family that may be interested.

Global Exploration Series: 4-H youth, volunteers, and families of all ages are encouraged to join us for the Fall 2022 Global Exploration Series. During each hourlong session, a UW-Madison international student will be presenting on their home country and culture followed by a Q & A session. There are two sessions remaining this fall: Thursday, December 1 from 7:30-8:30 PM (featuring China), and Thursday, December 13 from 7:30-8:30 PM. Registration remains open on 4-H Online.

NEW Building Safe Spaces Training for Volunteers

Beginning December 1

Who should take Building Safe Spaces Training? Volunteers and staff who work with youth in Extension Programs.

When should you take the training? The training opens on December 1, 2022. All new volunteers or returning volunteers that enroll on or after December 1st will be required to take the training. If you already enrolled as a volunteer, you will not be required to take the training until September of 2023.

What is the training about? Building Safe Spaces is designed to keep youth and adult volunteers safe. In three short modules, volunteers will learn to:

- Identify activities that put youth in danger
- Explore ways to keep youth safe in Extension programs
- Understand the difference between appropriate and inappropriate physical touch

Why is the training required? Wisconsin 4-H invests in you, the volunteers who support young people who participate in the program. Trainings are designed to provide additional knowledge and tools for volunteers and staff that work with youth. The information provided protects both the youth and the adults who work with them.

Where can you take the training? This is an interactive online training that works best on a computer or laptop, but can also be accessed on a mobile device and offline. If you do not have access to a computer or internet, contact your local educator for an offline version of the training. Each of the three modules takes approximately 10 minutes to complete (15 minutes in Spanish). 4-H Meats Judging Contest

Mark your calendars for the upcoming State 4-H Meats Judging Contest on Saturday, February 4, 2023! If you have participated in the past or this is the first time you are hearing about the contest, we would love to have you join us for this day of learning, fun, and competition.

What is the 4-H Meats Judging Contest? Have you been to your local meat market or grocery store lately and think you could choose the best cut of meat out of the case? Have you ever watched a live animal contest and thought you could

choose what animals would provide the best meat products? This is your opportunity to put those skills to work. This contest tests the knowledge of youth in the placement of carcass and retail cut classes, carcass grading, and retail cut identification. Top teams earn the opportunity to compete at regional and national competitions.

Who can participate? You must be a currently enrolled WI 4-H member to participate in this contest. The age divisions are: Junior – Age 8-13 as of January 1, 2023; Senior – Age 14-18 as of January 1, 2023. WI 4-H members that are in the 13th grade and have reached their 19th birthday prior to January 1, 2023 are eligible to compete at this state contest as individuals but not as a member of a team. Youth must be in or completed 3rd grade, 8-year-old Cloverbuds cannot participate.

Even if your county has not participated in the past, round-up some 4-H friends and take advantage of this fun opportunity to show your knowledge of the animal species and industry.
