- Tuesdays in March & April: Archery Practice

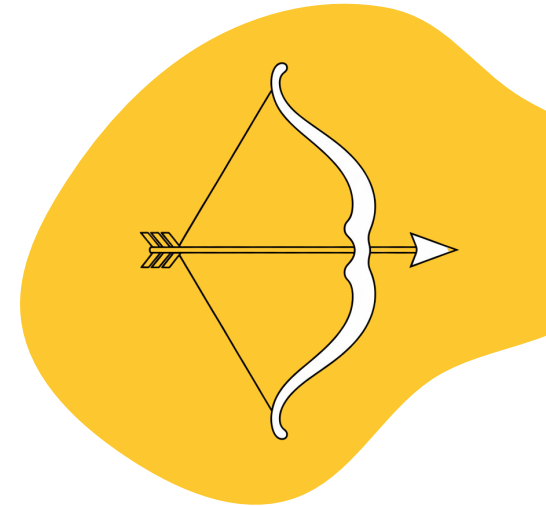

An opportunity for youth to gain knowledge of shooting sports, gain confidence in their shooting skills, and participate in wildlife ecology education



What do youth gain from Shooting Sports?

- Life Skills development
- Learn safe handling, responsible use of firearms and archery equipment
- Youth learn these skills through the 4-H model of learning-by-doing, which allows youth to try things they may not have the opportunity to try elsewhere in a highly supervised environment
- Developing technique and skills for target shooting
- Lifelong hobbies such as hunting and comfort around wildlife
- The experience from the wildlife ecology portion of shooting sports provides youth with education about specific ecology of the Wisconsin woods, waterways, plants and animals
